OTTAWA, March 21—(CP)—The line-up of plays invited to the finals of the seventh Dominion Drama Festival at London, Ont., the week of April 10, was announced here today by John Arden, honorary secretary-general of the festival.

The program, which begins that Monday night in London's old Grand Theatre, runs through to Saturday night, with Wednesday and Saturday matinees necessary to take care of all the contestant groups.

Last year's winners of the Beasborough Trophy, the Beaux Arts Society of Victoria, B. C., are not listed among the entries.

The program starts off with a tragic melodrama, "Dark Orchard," by H. Campbell Duncan, presented by the Arts and Letters Club of Toronto, winners of the Central Ontario regional festival last week. The play itself there won the title of best Canadian play.

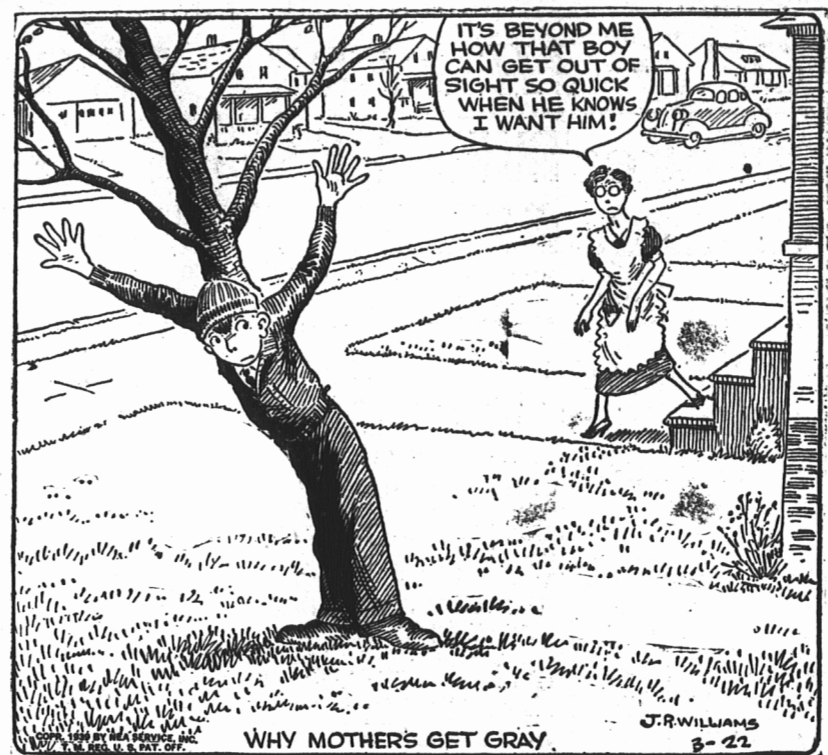
