HEART IS WEAKENING, PHYSICIANS SAY

Condition of The King Causing Grave Anxiety

Little Comfort Found in Yesterday's Statement on King George's Condition—Physicians Longer In Attendance at Palace and Visits Occur at More Frequent Intervals—Prince of Wales on the High Seas Enroute to England.

LONDON, Dec. 2.—Weakening of the heart of King George, reported by his physicians tonight, caused growing anxiety although the same report told of favorable progress in the lung infection. The two medical bulletins on His Majesty's condition during the day could only serve to increase distress in the public mind. They showed improvement in the local ailment and that the fever condition was less grave. Tonight's temperature was 100.

On the other hand the prolonged illness, which began with a heavy cold and developed into pleurisy and a slight infection of the lung, has now continued for 12 days and is beginning to tell on the royal patient's strength and power of resistance. Tonight for the first time the medical bulletin mentions His Majesty's heart as exhibiting a decline in strength which "causes anxiety."

The physicians were more frequently and longer in attendance at Buckingham Palace today than on any day since the illness set in except perhaps the day when an X-ray examination was made or that when Sir Humphrey Rolleston was called in as a consultant. This assiduous attendance by the physicians at morning, afternoon and evening, was an indication to the general public of their increased solicitude and that being Sunday, there was an enormous gathering outside the palace gates to await the night bulletin.

This morning's bulletin on His Majesty's condition was issued too late to be read to the congregations which had assembled in the churches, but there was none the less fervency in prayers everywhere offered for the sovereign's recovery.

ANXIETY INCREASED LONDON, Dec. 2.—Public anxiety was increased tonight when the physicians who had left Buckingham Palace at 9.30 returned about an hour later. They were still with the King a short time before midnight. It was understood that there was a possibility that a third physician would be called in.

MIDNIGHT BULLETIN LONDON, Dec. 2.—The medical bulletin issued just after midnight this morning says that anxiety concerning the strength of the heart of the King persists. It was signed by two consulting specialists as well as by the two regular physicians to His Majesty.

The bulletin read: "His Majesty the King has had some sleep during the last three hours. A further consultation confirms the opinion expressed in the last bulletin and in spite of the improvement in the lung anxiety concerning the strength of the heart persists."

It was signed by Sir Stanley Hewitt, Lord Dawson of Penn, both regular physicians to the King, Sir E. Farquhar Buzzard and Dr. L. E. Whitty.

Splendid Address on Flora Macdonald Delivered by Rev. W. Bruce Muir.

In St. James Church yesterday evening a service held in celebration of St. Andrew's day was attended by a large congregation. The musical portion of the service was well chosen, and the congregational singing of the hymns exceptionally good. The Minister, Rev. W. Bruce Muir, delivered a masterly address on heroine, Flora Macdonald. He spoke as follows: St. Andrew's Day has come and gone. The descendants of Scotsmen in every part of the habitable globe have gathered together once again to celebrate in song and story, the history, the glory, the romance of "Caledonia stern and wild."

How can we account for it? Geographically considered Scotland is only a dot on the map of the world, a mere unit of population, and yet its people have asserted an immeasurable grandeur of purpose and achievement in the affairs of this old planet of ours. We can only explain this world-wide influence by calling to remembrance the glorious truth that man liveth not by bread alone. In measuring it we must inevitably think of all the romance of Scotland's traichie and triumph. We must think of all the plaintive beauties of her ballads and her songs in the mistletoe. We must think of her psalms with their mixture of the stern and persuasive touching Scottish life in every department of it. We must lift our eyes to the timeless grandeur of Glamis and the countenances of the wee house among the heather, and the cottage of the road-side which heard the first cry of the infant Burns. We think of the great wair of the North Sea Walker Scott, coming down to modern times we think of that sickly boy Robert Louis Stevenson peering into the dusk to see the leerie light of the lamps of Edinburgh. We must think of the tartan lads of Alma, Balaclava and Inkerman and of Piper Finglater playing the last charge at Darguie. We must think also of Loch Tay livered by June sunlight, and Loch Lomond dark under November skies, also of Walter Scott's last home-coming and the bush above Traquair. We must see the white-crested breakers surging over the rocks at St. Andrews if we would understand some of the elements which enter into the soul of Scotland. To analyse that soul is
