The total number of candidates in the field down to October 20 according to the Montreal Star, with one of each party since added in New Brunswick, was as follows:

The entire number to be elected is 213, divided as follows: British Columbia 6; the Territories 4; Manitoba 7; Ontario 92; Quebec 65; New Brunswick 14; Nova Scotia 20; P. E. Island 5. The whole number of candidates in the field is 398. In Nova Scotia, P. E. Island, the Territories and British Columbia both parties have full tickets. In New Brunswick the Conservative ticket is full while the Liberals lack two of their full quota at present. In Manitoba each party lacks one of a full ticket, two so-called independents not being opposed. In Quebec and Ontario both parties have yet some gaps to fill.

The great strike of the anthracite coal regions of Pennsylvania, of which such frequent mention has been made in our despatches, began September 17th, and continued for a month. About 138,000 persons gave up work and they lost a month's work. They have gained a practical increase of 10 per cent in wages until April next. The price of hard coal in New York before the strike was \$5 per ton. It ran up to \$6.50 during the strike and has since been quoted at \$6. An enormous disturbance of trade and prices resulted, and the total reckoning of loss runs into millions. The mine owners, the miners, the railways, and transportation companies, and consumers of coal have lost heavily. Most consumers have to pay at least a dollar more per ton for their winter's supply of fuel, and after all very little is settled by the settlement. In due time the mine owners will cut wages again, and then perhaps, there will be another strike.

It is reported that Arabi Pasha, who led the revolt in Egypt eighteen or nineteen years ago, and who was then defeated, captured and exiled, has been granted permission to return to Egypt from Ceylon, whither he had been banished. It will be remembered that Arabi Pasha first organized the national party in Egypt in opposition to Anglo-French control of the finances, and became Egyptian Minister of War. His permission to return may be taken to indicate that British authority is now tolerably secure in Egypt, especially since the Arab revolt in the Soudan has been quelled, and civilized authority re-established in the territories of the Upper Nile. Besides the exiled leader is now grown old, and appears to have conducted himself discreetly during his enforced absence.

Mr. Bryan seems to be already forestalling and excusing his coming defeat. In a recent speech in Illinois he said:

"If the election were held to-day, there is no doubt that we would have a majority in the Electoral College and in the popular vote. But the Republican managers are now collecting from the monopolies a large campaign fund. They will buy every vote that can be bought. They will coerce every vote that can be coerced. They will intimidate every laboring man who can be intimidated. They will bribe every election judge who can be bribed. They will corrupt every court that can be corrupted."

We are in no way desirous of giving circulation to Licensed Victuallers' literature. Neither the Government nor the Opposition are committed to give the country prohibition. Candidates of both parties, now nearly all in the field, have been selected with very little regard to whether they are for or against prohibition. The question is in no way an issue between parties. We cannot therefore see the use of opening our columns at this time to articles whose prime object is the promotion of party interests rather than prohibition.

The proposal of the Local Council of Women to institute a branch historical society, naturally raises the question whether the ground is not already fully covered by the excellent Natural History and Antiquarian Society now in existence here. The latter half of its name would clearly imply, what we believe to be the fact. Another question might arise as to whether there is a sufficient field for two societies covering similar ground. We shall be glad to hear from those interested in this matter.

Court Avondale, I. O. F. at its meeting last evening made the handsome donation of fifty dollars to the Patriotic Monument Fund. This Court had a number of members at the front fighting their country's battles and among them were the two brave young men Taylor and Riggs, who fell at Paardeberg. We trust and believe that other benevolent and fraternal societies will also liberally aid the Monument Fund.

Mr. Edwards M. P. who was a brother lumberman, as well as a brother Liberal of Mr. H. H. Cook, says the latter made threats of what he would do if he did not get a Senatorship. Mr. Cook should have tried the Laurierite plan of "sunny ways."
