

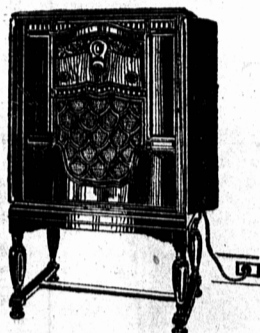

Entered into rest after a short but painful illness, borne with calm resignation to the Divine Will, at Greek River, Nov. 28th, 1928. Mildred Menetta Jenkins, in the 24th, year of her age. The family wish to thank neighbors and friends for kindness and aid during the sickness. To the bereaved and sorrowing family, the deep sympathy of the Community is extended.

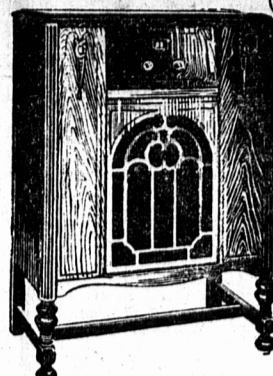
