CANADIANS ENTERED GERMAN TRENCHES

(Special to The Guardian.) LONDON, March 21.—Following issued by Canadian War Records: An official Canadian communication under date of March 18, says the week on the whole has been uneventful. There were encounters and the Germans made several ineffective attempts to enter our trenches, in particular on Tuesday night. The attacks were made after what was evidently a very carefully prepared bombardment. On one of these attempts succeeded. On the contrary, the attackers were driven back to their own lines and in one place left two dead in front of our wire. Later in the week a storming party of our men succeeded in entering German trenches, despite heavy opposition. In some places there was hand to hand fighting but no prisoners were secured. In others, the garrison jumped out of their trenches and ran back to their support lines. A few fine days have permitted greater aerial action and many fights have been witnessed above our lines. The hours have been about equally divided. There has also been a slight increase in artillery actions on both sides.

GERMANS TRY ANOTHER BLUFF

WASHINGTON, March 24.—Word that a European neutral might offer mediation to prevent open war between the United States and Germany has come to the administration without causing surprise or in any way affecting the Government's plans for meeting the situation forced by submarine ruthlessness. Such a proposal is regarded here as nothing more than another scheme fostered by Germany with the hope of confusing the issue and possibly dividing sentiment in this country, while the destruction of American lives and ships on the high seas continue.

At the State Department today officials would neither deny nor confirm that the Government already had been approached on this subject, although it was admitted informally that some such move was not unexpected. It was very emphatically stated that no suggestion of mediation or discussion would be considered unless it was accompanied by abandonment of illegal assaults upon American shipping, a course to which there is no reason for believing the Imperial Government is giving a thought.

GERMANS CUT RATIONS OF BREAD

AMSTERDAM, March 24 via London.—The bread rationing in Germany will be diminished one fourth, beginning April 15, owing to the scarcity of wheat, according to a despatch from Berlin in the Weser Zeitung of Bremen. The potato ration will be continued at five pounds weekly, and the meat ration will be increased by 250 grams weekly.

It is announced adds the despatch, that the curtailment in the use of wheat is necessary to insure the present stocks lasting until the next harvest. The announcement of the bread ration has caused surprise and consternation in Germany. The Rheinische Westfälische Zeitung says: "The reduction is a very painful surprise."

286 MEN LOST WHEN DANTON SANK

(Special to The Guardian.) LONDON, March 24.—The sinking of the French battleship Danton in the Mediterranean, 286 men were drowned. The Danton was torpedoed by a hostile submarine. The sinking by a German submarine in the Mediterranean on Mar. 19th, was reported by the German Admiralty on March 20.

GERMANS PLACE CAPTIVES IN FRONT LINES

NEW YORK, March 24.—A news agency despatch from Lausanne, Switzerland, today, says: "Germany has sent many of her captives to the front lines of battle as reprisals, according to a statement issued by the International Red Cross today. The statement said the Red Cross was endeavoring to dissuade the German authorities from such form of reprisals."

NEW RUSSIAN GOVERNMENT'S ATTITUDE

In the Matter of Foreign Affairs.—She Will Remain Faithful to Her Allies and Continue the Struggle.

Both For Her own Liberty and That of All Europe.—No Longer a Dead-weight in the Coalition of Allies.

LONDON, March 26.—The central committee and the parliamentary representatives of the constitutional democratic party at Petrograd voted today in favor of a republican form of government for Russia, according to a Petrograd despatch. Prof. Paul Mikulok the foreign minister in the new government, is leader of this party.

THE FOREIGN POLICY OF THE GOVERNMENT OUTLINED.

LONDON, March 24.—Foreign Minister Mikulok has outlined the attitude of the new Russian government in foreign affairs to a number of Petrograd and Moscow journalists. A despatch from Petrograd quotes the foreign minister as saying: "We shall remain faithful to all past alliances, similar to that with our allies, which will be still further strengthened and become still more cordial and sacred. The change in regime will disperse the distrust our allies had a right to feel toward the late government. It is Russia's duty to continue to struggle brilliantly both for her own liberty and that of all Europe. "By the change in regime we definitely won the sympathy of neutrals especially Sweden, while Finland, thanks to the restoration of her constitution, has become our sincere friend. Our allies came into touch with the new regime without an instant's delay, understanding that the old regime was a serious hindrance to that organization of the Russian people which is necessary for a final triumph. "Today Russia is no longer a deadweight in the coalition of allies. She is a productive force. Henceforth all rumors of a separate peace must vanish once for all. It would be anti-national for freed Russia to come to an understanding with reactionary Germany."

EMPERESS ZAUDITU RULES ABYSSINIA

WASHINGTON, March 25.—Accession to the throne of Abyssinia by Empress Zauditu, succeeding Menelik II., was reported in a proclamation from Foreign Minister Caganzmatch Baiane Iemer, dated Addis, Ababa, January 12, which reached the State Department.

The accession of the Empress is the final act in a long religious and court conflict in which a Mohammedan attempt to overthrow the world's oldest Christian country was defeated in a bitter revolution. Recognition of the new government is now before the State Department.

UNITED STATES PREPARING FOR WAR

(Special to The Guardian.) WASHINGTON, March 26.—The President authorizes the navy strength to be brought up to \$7,000,000. The President ordered the enrollment of many regiments of troops. Today twenty additional infantry regiments and five separate battalions of national guards in eighteen of the western and middle states. Today seven hundred interned German men-of-war's men were transferred from Philadelphia to Fort St. George.

FIVE GERMAN AIRPLANES FELL

(Special to The Guardian.) PARIS, March 26 Five German airplanes were brought down yesterday by our pilots. Two were destroyed by Adjutant Ortol, bringing up to eight the number of enemy machines brought down thus far by this officer. One of our aerial squadrons last night dropped 1,000 kilograms of projectiles on factories at Thionville and in the Basin of Briey and also on railroad stations of Conflans and Montmedy.

DENOUNCED KAISER AND HOLL- WEG.

London, March 24.—The German Emperor and Chancellor Von Bethmann-Hollweg were denounced in the Reichstag by Socialist Deputy Kunert as the originators of the war. The incident occurred on Thursday during the debate of the public health estimates. Vice-Chancellor Heleferich referring to Herr Kunert's remarks declared that the German who spoke in the same breath of the Russian and German conditions insulted his fatherland. The Socialist deputy retorted amid Socialist applause. "Because I compared the German reactionaries with Russian revolutionists you say I insulted the fatherland. I should be proud if such progress were made in our country as has been made in the Russian empire."
