Russians Persuading Turks

LONDON, Feb. 20.—The Russian army which captured Ezerum in Armenia is endeavoring to cut off the retreat of the Turks who are retreating with speed. Despatches from Petrograd report the capture of the town of Mush and Achat to the south, heavy fighting proceeding the taking of the towns by storm. The next objective of the southern wing of the Russian army is Piabek which lies within striking distance of Bagdad. This line would open up a road for the Russians into Syria. Along the Black Sea coast Russian warships are pounding the Turkish batteries and harassing the retreating troops. The northern wing of the Russian army captured the town of Widje and are driving the Turks back in the direction of Gumish Khansh on the road to Trebizond while large Russian forces are moving westward from Ezerum with the object of cutting off these Turkish troops before they can reach the new line of defence. The Germans have been operating vigorously against the British and French along the Yser canal in Belgium to north of Ypres. From the British 550 metres of a position was captured and held despite hand grenade attacks to recapture it. After a heavy bombardment the Germans attempted to cross the canal and occupy French positions. Several groups of them did succeed in making their way to the French line trench. The French however immediately drove them back. The British to the south of Loos in a lively engagement succeeded in making an advance to the edge of a mine crater held by the Germans. The French in Champagne between the Meuse and Moselle rivers and to the west of the forest of Apremont have bombarded successfully the German positions while in the Argonne forest a mine was exploded by the French which shattered the German works. Only isolated engagements have taken place on the Russian front. On the Austro-Italian line artillery duels continue. Continuing their advance into Albania the Austro-Hungarian report the capture near Baza Sjak a short distance northwest of Durrës of an advanced Italian position this is the first indication that the Italians were operating so far north in Albania. The belief prevailed that their activity had been confined to the locality adjacent to Avlona. That progress is being made by the Teutonic Allies in the direction of Avlona is shown by the report that the Albanians fighting with them occupied the town of Berat situated about 31 miles north east of Avlona.

German Aircraft In Riga Rigeon

PETROGRAD, Feb. 20.—The following official communication from General Headquarters was issued. Enemy aeroplanes flew over several places in the Riga region. The Germans developed a strong artillery fire in the Kirchholm Irkskull sector. Our artillery had good effect before Irkskull in the region of Ogerand and west of Probstinshoff. German aeroplanes threw many bombs in the region north of Kreuzberg. North of Divinsk two zeppelins flew over Mischel. Near Divinsk the enemy developed a violent artillery fire in the region of Lake Sventen our artillery destroyed two German blockhouses. On Dbiester near Mikhalteche we exploded a sap which destroyed entanglements and several armoured trenches. An attempt by the enemy to dislodge by heavy artillery fire and bombs our troops who occupied the crater failed.

PRINCE EDWARD THEATRE

At the Prince Edward Theatre last night a programme of exceptional merit was shown to crowded houses. "The Diamond from the Sky" being, of course, the leading attraction. The diamond in this installment again changes owners and how it eventually finds its way back into the hands of Blair Stanley provides a story of thrilling interest. The scenes in Chinatown are hair-raising and from start to finish one is on tenterhooks with anxiety for the safety of the Christian actors in the den of the crafty Oriental priests. "The Village Homestead" was a three-reel story with a feature which is rarely found in the best pictures—a really good plot. A description would spoil the effect and those who care for a clever play should not fail to see it. The other pictures were excellent and the programme was altogether a great attraction.

ROOM GOWNS

Not much is in a name, we have always been taught to believe, but nevertheless a name is often very suggestive. Anybody would know that a camisole or an underbodice, even if it answered the same purpose as a corset cover, would be a daintier bit of lingerie than its predecessor. And anybody would know that a room gown would be different than a matinee or a negligee or a kimona. It immediately suggests something more serviceable, less informal than a negligee, and something far less formal than a house frock.

A room gown is simply a sort of gown to wear when one is in one's own room. Usually it is belted in at the waist, or thereabouts, and it very often has a shirt that fastens in the back or at the side—not in the direct centre front. Often, too, there is a sort of cross-over or sash arrangement that really holds the top part in snugly to the figure and keeps it tight together. Such a gown should be made of something other than chiffon or any other very transparent material. It is useful, too, if it is made of a washable material. Crepe de chine or dotted swiss or challis is a good choice of material for it. This is just the sort of thing for a college girl, who likes to remove the clothes in which she has been playing hockey or riding or attending lectures when she goes to her room to study. As a rule, she slips into a filmy negligee or a loose kimona; then if other girls come to her room, or if she decides to make tea or if she wishes to slip to the room of a companion, she finds herself too unsubstantially clad. The room gown is just the thing she needs—something of a negligee order, yet something that does not flop about and fly open at all times. The room gown, too, would be a very useful gown for the woman who lives in a small apartment. In such an apartment, without a maid, as such an apartment very often is, the room gown would be a safe refuge for the hostess if she wished to get into something comfortable or at rest or an hour's reading or letter writing. Then the unexpected ring at the bell would not find her unrepresentable. She could even slip into such a gown to manipulate the electric toaster and percolator for breakfast, or the tiny kitchenette, without the feeling of undress such an understating as a negligee or ribbons, chiffon and lace would cause.
