Police Commissioner O'Meara, of Boston, a native of this province, is retiring this year from his office, his commission having expired. Strenuous efforts are being made in many civic circles to have Mr. O'Meara continue his commissionership, or rather, to have him re-appointed in office. On the contrary other forces are moving it their business to ask for his final retirement and the battle between the two camps around Governor Foss, who will make the appointment of another official or re-appointing Mr. O'Meara. A recent Boston Post says: Six representative clergymen called on Governor Foss yesterday afternoon to endorse the administration of the police department under Commissioner Stephen O'Meara. A petition, signed by 150 names, purporting to be Protestant ministers had been previously to Governor Foss asking that O'Meara be re-appointed. Dr. Myers made the statement that there were 150 names of ministers signed to this petition. The committee politely doubted that 150 Protestant ministers in Boston are lined up against the re-appointment of this committee to the Governor follows: "We have learned that certain prominent clergymen of Boston have approached you. Excellency to urge you not to re-appoint Mr. O'Meara as police commissioner. While we do not believe that these gentlemen claim the right to represent their various religious denominations officially, nevertheless the implication from the newspaper reports is practically to the effect that the Protestant clergy of Boston are opposed as a body to the re-appointment of Mr. O'Meara. We regret exceedingly that the public should form the opinion that the Protestant clergy of Boston as a body are opposed to Mr. O'Meara's appointment. We emphatically assert that such is not the fact. We are acquainted with the course of Mr. O'Meara's regime as police commissioner. We believe that he is a gentleman of the highest personal integrity, and that during his term of office the police department has been free from political control and many other corrupting influences. We also believe that he has given us a useful and efficient administration."

TYPICAL DAY WITH QUEEN MARY
LONDON, April 15—An interesting letter describing a typical day passed by Queen Mary at Buckingham Palace has been received by Miss Mary Egerton, of Terrington written by a lady holding a high position at court, an intimate friend of the Queen and a truthful woman of no imagination.
The letter, which is published in the Yorkshire Post, states that the Queen by going through her large correspondence (which she has previously opened) with two secretaries. Then come interviews with the governess, housekeeper and the heads of departments with furniture makers and various correspondence till 1.30. In the afternoon her majesty visits a hospital, some charitable institution, a picture gallery or some other interesting places in or near London, such as the city churches, the halls of the various city companies, etc. After tea the Queen again summons and gives one or two interviews. After dinner she reads till 10.30 and then retires to rest.
In the country expeditions to historical or other interesting places in the neighborhood with some of her children are arranged but helping people to help themselves, and she always considers whether assistance given to the individual will help the whole community or merely create a class dependent upon it, such as is found in connection with night shelters, etc.
"With the exception of a few charities taken up by the late Duchess of Teck and kept on for love of her mother, the queen's name to a charity is really a guarantee that it is good and properly worked. The queen believes in character as against sentimental talk and feeling, and she would never pander to the popular fad of the day unless the fad was sound and sensible.
"Of course, therefore, she has not been properly appreciated by the man in the street, but she is beginning to be understood by all thinking people and will be so more and more as time goes on. I think it is her innate sense of truth and right proportion that prevents her being carried away, as many women are, by the feeling of the moment."

MOVES IN EDDY CASE AUCTION SALE
CONCORD, N. H., April 17—The litigation over the will of Mrs. Mary Baker Eddy, founder of the Christian Science Church, was continued today by action in both the State and the federal courts and notification of proposed further action.
In the United Circuit Court in the suit brought by Dr. E. J. Foster, attorney of Waterbury, Vt., adopted son of Mrs. Eddy, attacking the validity of the residuary clause of the will of the ground that the statutes forbid so large a bequest to a single church, counsel for Executor Henry M. Baker and the other defendants filed a demurrer.
The demurrer set up the claim that the statutes in question are not applicable to this case, inasmuch as Mrs. Eddy left the residue of her estate to the First Church of Christ, Scientist, of Boston, not for the local uses of that church, but for the specific purpose of a general extension of the religion of Christian Science. The demurrer also denies the right of Dr. Foster Eddy to contest the will, on the ground that before Mrs. Eddy's death he waived such right in view of a cash settlement, and declares that the attorney-general of New Hampshire and George W. Glover of Lond., N. H., Mrs. Eddy's son, should be made parties to this suit.
In the Merrimack County Superior Court, counsel for George W. Glover, in his suit of a similar character, filed an amendment to their bill, in which they assert that the residuary clause of the will should be declared invalid, because it is indefinite, their contention being that no one knows precisely what the Christian Science religion, to promote which residue is devoted, is. They also protested against the admission as parties to the case of various persons, alleged relatives of Mrs. Eddy, who have asked leave to intervene on the ground that if the residuary clause of the will should be declared invalid, they would be entitled to share in a distribution of the residue.
A new figure appeared in the litigation when counsel for George W. Glover's son, George W. Glover, Jr., notified Chief Justice Wallace of the Superior Court that they would shortly file a motion for leave to intervene in Mr. Glover's suit. They said that they would base their action on the ground that George W. Glover, Jr. was a minor when the deeds of settlement were executed between his father and Dr. Foster Eddy and Mrs. Eddy, and that if the court should declare the residuary clause of the will invalid, but bar Messrs. Glover and Eddy from a share in the residue because of this agreement, the property should go to George W. Glover, Jr., as next of kin.
