News To Them

(Special to The Guardian)

OTTAWA, Nov. 5.—The Dominion Government has no knowledge of the proposal to build five 7,000 ton ships to carry coal from Britain to Canada, which was mentioned in the British House of Commons by Right Hon. J. H. Thomas today. If Canadians are embarking on such an enterprise with the object of bringing 600,000 tons of hard coal to Canada, the sponsors are private interests having no connection with the Government of Canada. Nor does the Government at Ottawa know anything of the proposed exports credit commission to finance large movements of steel from Britain. If such a commission is to be formed, it will be formed by the British Government with the object of marketing in Canada the more expensive steel products. Steel rails sufficient to meet the needs of the Canadian railways are made in Canada, and the same applies to other steel products of the cheaper grades.

developing plans for carrying on more speedily and efficiently the services of his department now covering the whole of Canada. Mr. Faith spent several days on the Island last week and just before returning to the mainland on Saturday expressed to a representative of the Guardian the pleasure and interest he had experienced in finding evident prosperity among all classes of the rural people, the breeders of purebred live stock particularly.

Mr. Faith was inclined to think that P. E. Island offers wonderful opportunity for breeders of Holsteins who are prepared to develop cattle of the type and quality now in popular demand, and instanced a case of recent happening which resulted in a breeder from Ontario coming to this Island for a car-load of registered Holsteins, selected at prices on a par with average figures paid in any section of the country this year, as an illustration in concrete form that where the goods are buyers are prepared to go in making their purchases.

Mr. Faith said that he had during his stay here visited most of the large herds and to his great satisfaction found many Holsteins, both males and females, of superior merit which he felt sure would enable the breeders owning them to build up most creditable herds, in turn abroad which would be found most profitable. He said, he looked for expansion of the Holstein breed in all sections of the Island due to the growing demand for milk in the towns and cities, the improved outlook for butter and cheese and the tendency among farmers to equip their farms with more productive and therefore more remunerative herds.

"The black and white cow," concluded the Director of Extension, "has found her place on the Island as evidenced in the splendid herds I have seen in my travels of the past few days and I venture to predict that this growth and progress of the breed, as yet in its infancy, is due for a big forward movement now that the general merit of the breed is so widely recognized."

OTTAWA, Ont., Nov. 5.—Denial was made by the Department of Immigration and Colonization today that the Canadian Government had agreed to pay for the transportation of Menonite peasants to Canada and to furnish those people with agricultural tools and other necessities. That is not true, an official of the Department declared. It was further stated at the Department that if any of those peasants were admitted to this country, Canadian Immigration authorities will have to be given assurances that they will be cared for by their co-religionists already in the Dominion.

Dr. Sexton urged as the first step toward improving education. Such men (good teachers) are rarer than Shaws or Churchills, or Haigs and more important for the era which we have now entered. Dr. Sexton stated. Keep up technical education. Dr. Sexton urged upon the Dominion Government, instancing the relative poverty of provincial depts. of education that would never be able to subsidize this phase of instruction adequately. In preparation for the task of educating "Mr. and Miss Tomorrow," Dr. Sexton said, we should entirely change the methods of our teaching. Instead of making our main aim the inculcation of a definite mass of information under discipline, we should be charged also with the task of developing certain innate traits of personality and character. We could perform no higher service to the nation than by tying a few knots in the red tape of our routine and stopping to delve into such a basic and important field of inquiry.

could in any other part of the Dominion, for in addition to their farming activities they could carry on some profitable sideline that would repay them for their labors and at the same time make them feel contented with their new life, he said. Asked if Canada was being advertised as it should be in Great Britain, Mr. Gardell asserted that the Dominion was over-advertised in the wrong way. "The English people are being told of Canada in colorful terms, and are not told the truth about the country, with the result that the reaction to the settlers coming out is more harmful than otherwise from a British immigration point of view."

He felt that if a true picture of Canada was given to the people of the British Isles, a picture setting out its vastness, its newness, its difference in mode of living and the hardships to be encountered by the new settlers, it would result in a more contented lot of British immigrants coming out, as they would find just what they were expecting when they arrived. "Yet the failure in British immigrants has been very small, considering it all," he added.

He urged the delegates to stand back of the nominee regardless of their own initial choice. Mr. Wyatt promised the candidate chosen and the party his wholehearted support. He paid a very high tribute to the work and integrity of the late Hon. James A. McNeill.

The Nominations.

Nominations were then received as follows: For Mr. J. F. Arnett, Summerside, moved by Mr. H. M. Downing, Summerside, seconded by Mr. Hugh D. MacPhee, Coleman. For Hon. Adrian Arsenault, Summerside, moved by Mr. Birch, Alberton, seconded by Joseph H. Morrissey, Tignish.

Mr. Shelton Sharp, East Bideford was also nominated, but declined the honor in favor of the younger men. Balloting then took place and resulted as follows: Arnett, 110; Arsenault 95. Mr. Arsenault, amidst thunderous applause, came to the platform and after thanking the delegates, asked his supporters to work as hard for Mr. Arnett as they would for him, and assured the meeting that he would do everything in his power for the party. He moved that the vote for Mr. Arnett be made unanimous, which was done by a unanimous standing vote and three cheers for the chosen standard bearer.

Mr. Arnett Accepts Nomination.

Mr. Arnett, who received a tremendous ovation, said that he very highly appreciated the confidence placed in him. He realized that the task before him would be a difficult one, but he had faith in them and the Liberal Conservative party. He would start out from today with the determination of carrying the constituency. Never was there a time that he should look more optimistically to the future. We should, he said, support the party which works for the Canadian people and the present administration does not seem to be legislating that way. There was hardly a person present in the large gathering before him who had not relatives in the United States as a consequence of the Liberal policy. If returned to Ottawa he would do all in his power to encourage the farmers and manufacturers of Canada and thus create employment for Canada's sons and daughters (hear, hear). Mr. Arnett concluded his remarks by paying a high tribute to Hon. R. B. Bennett, a leader of whom all could be justly proud.

Further Resolutions.

The following resolutions were unanimously passed: Whereas the effect of the policy of the Mackenzie King Government has been detrimental to the best interests of Canada, which the continued exodus of the youth of this country clearly shows. And whereas the present Dominion Government has utterly failed to protect Canadian agricultural interests against unfair competition in the home market, at a time when prohibitive tariffs are raised against Canadian producers; And whereas the policy of the Liberal Conservative party as enunciated by Hon. R. B. Bennett, has in the past in every way built up Canada;

Therefore resolved that we the Conservatives of Prince County in convention assembled reaffirm our confidence in the principles and policy of the great Conservative party, under the leadership of the Honorable Mr. Bennett and our belief that Canada's future prosperity lies in his early return to power. Moved by G. M. Mathews, seconded by John A. S. Hackett.
