THE BUENOS AIRES SITUATION—Mrs. John Wilson, Upper Prince St., who has just returned from visiting Boston, where she accompanied her brother, Mr. John Murchison, en route for England, brought back word that a cable had been received to the effect that work in Buenos Aires had been resumed, and that the new government effectively guaranteed freedom to all workmen. Previously the socialists, who were the tools of the deposed President, refused to allow anyone to work at the docks unless they were socialists. The cable, which was addressed to Mr. Murchison, read as follows: "The Barracos labourers stopped for twenty-four hours, but today recommenced work lifting all boycotts. Everything now completely normalized in all the republic and the present Government effectively guarantees freedom to work to everybody. (Signed) Murchison."

The Late Mr. Henry Fitz Gerald

The funeral of the late Mr. Henry FitzGerald was held Tuesday morning from the home of his son, Mr. Henry J. FitzGerald, 42 Water St. to St. Dunstan's Basilica, where Solemn Requiem High Mass was celebrated by Rev. Monsignor McDonald, assisted by Rev. P. McMahon, as deacon, and Rev. Fr. McCarthy, as sub-deacon. Interment was at the Roman Catholic Cemetery, where services were conducted by Rev. George McDonald. The members of the Knights of Columbus attended the funeral in a body. The pall bearers were Messrs Roderick McDonald, J. C. Moran, H. F. McPhee, Mark R. McGuigan, George R. McLellan, and W. D. Gillis.

In his church and social connections the late Mr. FitzGerald was an outstanding man in the community. Born at Brackley Point in 1852, the son of the late David FitzGerald, who emigrated to this province from Ireland, Mr. FitzGerald received his education at Rustico, where as a young man he was first employed by Joseph Gallant merchant and later as a cashier in the Rustico Bank.

Fifty-three years ago Mr. FitzGerald removed to Charlottetown where he was employed by the Prince Edward Island Railway. For more than forty-four years he served as freight clerk, in which position he gained a reputation for efficiency and devotion to duty, winning the esteem and respect of all who knew him.

Mr. FitzGerald was the last surviving charter member of the St. Vincent de Paul Society, which he, with the late Prof. Caven and Anneas McDonald, established fifty-one years ago. He was honorary president of the society at the time of his death.

Mr. FitzGerald was predeceased four months by his wife who passed away on June 9 last but is survived by five daughters, Misses Emma W. and Kathleen V. of Charlottetown, Mrs. Frank Harrington of Middlebury, Vermont, Mrs. John W. McDowell, and Mrs. Clara Howatt of Boston, Mass. and by two sons, Henry J. City and Reginald D. St. Pierre. He is also survived by one brother, David, of Grand Rapids Minnesota.

NEW YORK, Oct. 15—Even the lowering cloud of business depression has its silver lining, according to John E. Edgerston, newly elected president of the National Association of Manufacturers.

"One cannot rejoice over a disaster which causes unemployment," he says, "but I really believe that both industry and the masses of workers and consumers will profit tremendously from this depression. Industry is learning something about controlling output and insuring itself against over-production. The people in general are learning that the old moralities still hold; that extravagance, folly and financial wild-catting are just as dangerous as they ever were."

"In my opinion it was the get-rich-quick mania, with its gaudy paper profits, with its illusory money surplus and its high-pressure salesmanship which caused the graft, waste and ricklessness now prevalent in American cities."
