SYMPATHY FROM THE WEST.

The Toronto News has an appreciative reference to the Maritime Provinces and our people. The more the native Ontario sees the Eastern Provinces the better he likes the inhabitants thereof, we are told, and the more he becomes convinced that the type of Canadian down by the sea is destined to wield a great influence in the country.

"We are deeply interested in their success. We recognize the finances of their contribution to the national type. Permanent, deep-headed, steady, with a vein of eloquence that comes to the surface in their greatest public men, a force for nation-building, and with an endowment of imagination that has been proved in many Maritime makers of verse, above all, with a genuine gift for handling men, the native of Maritime Canada far more than holds his own in the councils of the Dominion."

Further we are told that there has been some academic discussion of Maritime Union, "which would seem to promise a great impulse to the development of the three Atlantic Provinces". To this we answer an emphatic yes! if by union is meant a physical connection by rail; an equally emphatic No! if a mere political and paper union is meant without the connecting link of free and constant communication.

"It is true, as has been alleged, that in Prince Edward Island during the winter months those who ship freight to the mainland have at times to pay three and four charges from Charlottetown to Georgetown and back again in an endeavor to locate the steamship line which sails either from one port or the other, according to its convenience, it would seem that the new Minister of Railways and Canals might take the case into his consideration since the freight is paid to a Government road. A Tunnel would cost an enormous sum of money; but a remedy for existing grievances must be found."

Our winter disabilities are so outrageous, so shamefully in violation of our compact with Canada, that we are surprised to find The News prefacing its reference thereto with an "if". As to the "enormous sum" which The News says a Tunnel would cost, say from eight to ten millions—reliable contractors offer to build it for that—has our Toronto colleagues given consideration to what a Tunnel would save to the Dominion and earn for the Dominion?

We invite The News to tabulate the cost of building, maintaining, repairing and operating the two present winter steamers and the third now to be built and put on; adding to this the cost of insurance in their extra hazardous work, and of renewals when worn out; adding to this the cost of the ice-boat service at the Capes; the present \$12,500 subsidies for carrying the mails, and the \$7,000 subsidy to the Anglo-American Telegraph Company, all of which would be saved by the Tunnel.

Add to this the saving of damages which the Dominion must pay, for nonfulfillment of the terms of union, having already paid a million for past failures, thus admitting

LIQUOR MEN ALARMED.

"Prohibition is gaining ground steadily and rapidly. The movement is gaining ground like a prairie fire. And it is our fault. We have been blind. We have refused to see; we would not understand. Now we have to. We cannot longer evade the issue. . . . It is the dive, the doggerly, that is poisoning the business—the saloon where liquor is sold to minors, the saloon that caters to thugs and thieves. It has got to go. There is no alternative. There must be no temporizing or delay. We either cast it overboard and save ourselves, or we all go down together."
