**Tender Fruit:**

**ORDER IN COUNCIL**  
Order-in-Council P. C. 1158 of July 2nd, 1929, provides the following amendments to the Tender Fruit Regulations as contained in the Fruit Act:

Subsections (b) and (c) of Section 10 of the said Regulations, established by Order-in-Council P. C. 2193 of January 5, 1927, are hereby rescinded, and the following substituted therefor:

(b) No. 1 shall consist of field tomatoes which are clean, reasonably smooth, sound tomatoes of similar varietal characteristics, uniform state of maturity but not over-ripe, well formed, free from blossom and stem ends, growth cracks or other scars which are likely to cause leaking or materially affect the appearance of the fruit, and free from damage caused by disease, insects, or other means, no culls and of a minimum size of two inches in diameter.

(c) No. 2 shall consist of field tomatoes which are clean, sound, uniform state of maturity, but not over-ripe, free from blossom and stem ends, growth cracks or other scars or damage, which is likely to cause leaking or materially affect the appearance and market value of the fruit and of a minimum size of one and three-quarter inches in diameter.

Section 1 of the said Regulations is hereby amended by the addition of the following paragraph (b):

(b) "which materially affects the appearance of the fruit" means concentric scars around the stem end may be permitted providing same do not exceed in the aggregate one complete circle one and one-quarter inches in diameter, or one growth crack radiating from the stem end, well healed over, and not exceeding three-quarters inch in length.

Section 16 of the Regulations as established by Order-in-Council P. C. 1111 of June 8, 1927, is hereby rescinded and the following substituted therefor:

Apples, plums, prunes, pears, peaches, field tomatoes, cherries, grapes or apricots may be offered for sale in bushel or half-bushel baskets or hampers with open sides and open slatted top, without liners or pads, also in 20-qt., 11-qt., 6-qt., or 2-qt. baskets with lino or patent covers, without a grade designation provided by this Act or regulations thereunder, but shall include no culls and shall be stamped, in addition to all other marks required, in a plain and indelible manner in letters not less than three-quarters of an inch in length, on the handle, cover, side or ends of the basket with the word "Ungraded."

**London Letter**

LONDON, July 13 — We have always expected a lot from our 'Boobies,' whether 'ex' or actual, and Mr. J. H. Hayes, M. P. will shortly begin to show up what a retired sergeant of police can do if he is put to it. For he is to be appointed Vice-Chamberlain of the Royal Household — an office which can properly be described as a whole time job, and then some. Also it is one which requires a brave man.

The Vice-Chamberlain is the bearer of messages from the King to Parliament. Dressed within an inch of his life and wearing upon his breast something which suggests the Urin and Thuppin, the King's Peacock appears upon the faithful Commons when occasion requires. An admiring House breathlessly watches the apparitor approach the Speaker, deliver his message and then back out from the House according to a prescribed ritual of steps and bows which, like the law of the Medes and Persians, altereth not.

Who shall say what emotions fill the minds of the members as they gaze upon the beautiful One? Do they hope that he will not trip over some of his legs, or are they afraid that he won't?

But that is not all. Upon the shoulders of Mr. Hayes qua Vice-Chamberlain will evolve the duty of writing a daily to His Majesty a written report on what his legislators have been up to. Will old habits of his police days prevail?

We hear a lot about dual personalities in these days: will the style of the Vice-Chamberlain merge into this sort of thing?

"Police Sergeant John Hayes, of the XYZ Division giving evidence said — 'Your Worship, at four-thirty a. m. on the day in question I was on duty in the House of Commons. The prisoners — I mean the members — showed signs of intoxication — I mean intelligence — and on the request of the Inspector — I mean of the Speaker — I went, that is to say I proceeded, etc.

At this writing it is not unfeeling to say that the House of Commons is a fair copy to propose that Captain Fitzroy, the Speaker of the House of Commons in the last Parliament, will again fill that high office in the new Parliament soon to assemble. If so it will be an odd turn of the whirrligig of time that a descendant of the Stuart Kings who fought a constant and unavailing battle against the rights of the House should, nearly 300 years later, preside over a Parliament which is under Socialist control.

And he'll need all his wits about him. This new House is a family party. What modes of address will be proper? Will Miss Megan be 'my honorable daughter' to Lloyd George? Will Sir Austen Chamberlain continue to refer to his half-brother Neville as 'my right honorable nephew'?

Will Mr. Baldwin fill address Baldwin pere in the fashion of 'Look here, Dad?' And what will happen when a husband on one side of the House exhorts his consort on the other — 'Dammittall, Maria, do listen to reason just for once!'

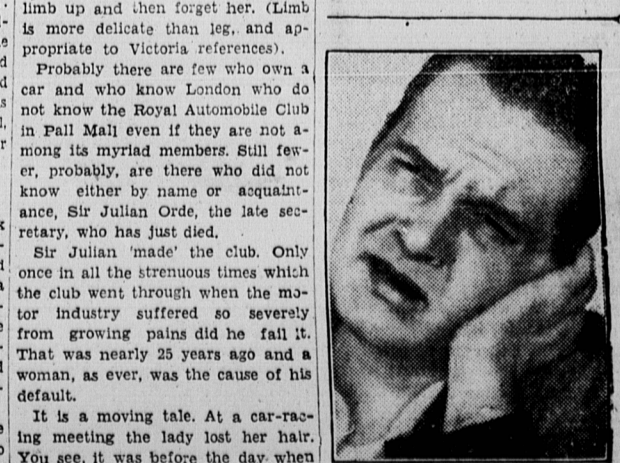
