Chubby Dean Had Yanks Number Yesterday

NEW YORK, April 15 (AP)—Lovell (Chubby) Dean of Philadelphia Athletics has New York Yankees' number on opening day at least. A year ago he duelled Red Ruffing for 10 innings in which each parcelled out six hits and then he drove in a run in the 10th for a 2-1 victory. Today he again opposed Ruffing and handcuffed the Yanks on five hits for a 3-1 American Baseball League triumph before 40,128 fans who turned out for New York's home opening. At Cleveland, Bob Feller felled Indians in their opener. Before a record crowd of 46,064, the Iowa strike-out king walked seven men, hit two more and gave five hits in the first six innings to stake Chicago White Sox to a 4-3 triumph. While Feller walked across what proved to be the winning run, the veteran Bill Dietrich hurried steady seven-hit ball.

Approve Principal Of Penalizing Players Who Sign With More Than One Club

CALGARY, April 15 (CP)—The Canadian Amateur Hockey Association today approved the principle that players should be penalized for signing agreements to play for more than one club. The approval came at the closing session of the annual convention when delegates adopted a resolution that Jack Forsey of Cornwall, Ont., pay \$25 to the Baltimore club for expenses incurred by the scout who signed Forsey to a player's contract. The 30-odd delegates also agreed with a recommendation of the committee in defeating a resolution that the C.A.H.A. revert to the referee and linesman system of officiating instead of using two men of equal authority. Royals win From Oshawa Generals 7-4

MAPLE LEAF GARDENS, TORONTO, April 15 (CP)—A 22-year famine ended tonight when Montreal Royals became the first team from Quebec Province ever to enter the Memorial Cup final by defeating Oshawa Generals 7-4 in the fifth game of their best-of-five series for the Eastern Canadian junior hockey title. At the same time the youngsters from Montreal, who overcame a series of handicaps that ran from a star defenceman getting hurt early in the second period to a half dozen of their members falling victim of 'air sickness' on a plane ride earlier in the day from Montreal, also put an end to Oshawa's hopes of a third straight Memorial Cup.

Cardinals Confirm Suspicion

NEW YORK, April 15 (AP)—St. Louis Cardinals today confirmed advanced suspicions that they are the challengers of the National Baseball League by out-homering the world champion Reds 7-3 before 34,940 fans at Cincinnati. The lineal descendants of the old 'Gas House Gang' also gave indication that all those vitamin pills may be more than a gag by filling Crosley Field with plenty of defensive as well as offensive pepper. Paul Derringer, co-ace of the Cincinnati pitching staff, couldn't survive four-base blows by Ernie Koy and Enos Slaughter, and Fireman Joe Beggs laid the ball in the slot for Powerhouse Johnny Mize in the ninth. Frank McCormick, the league's most valuable player, contributed a pair of homers and a single, but three double-plays cut the Reds down almost every other time they threatened.

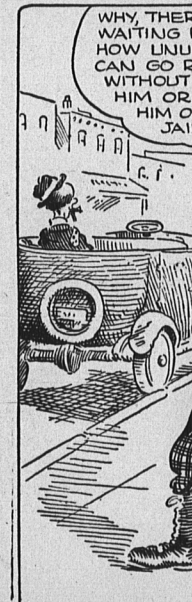

C.A.H.A. gives Ruling on Enlistments

CALGARY, April 14 (CP)—War-time regulations providing that hockey clubs which lose players through enlistment must make replacements within certain time limits were passed here today by the annual convention of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association. Previously such replacements could be obtained at any time. The delegates also passed resolutions authorizing bonuses for clubs participating in the senior and junior playdowns and grants for war purposes or war charities, and providing for intermediate playdowns in Eastern Canada next season. The meeting also adopted resolutions limiting the total of life members to six, changing the by-laws to allow life members to act only as honorary officers of the organization and declaring expenses of life members would be paid only to annual meetings.

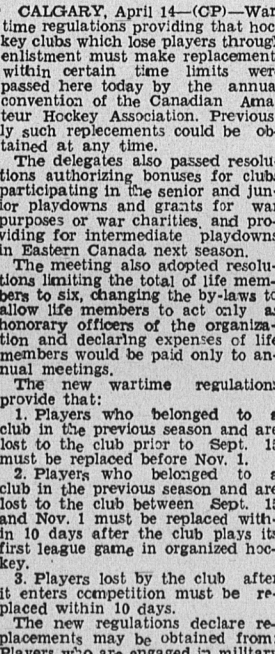

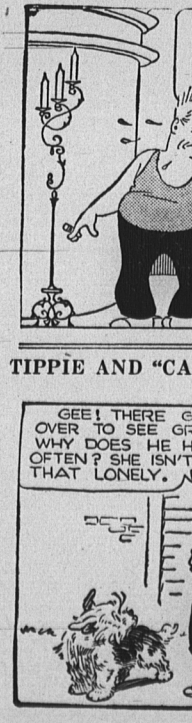
