MONDAY's Boston Herald says:—Icebergs have turned up in the North Atlantic steamer track nearly two months earlier than the record. Those so far reported by steamships at this point are not simply single bergs that have broken away from the north pack accidentally, but have been reported for the last two weeks as floating to the southward in great groups, these containing anywhere from two to seventy-five, and all of them strong, healthy bergs. With them, too, immense flocks of acid ice-floes are found. The first of the ice was reported here by colliers that had kept to the northward of the Atlantic lane, bound into Louisburg for coal. Now come reports of field ice and bergs from every ship making port. It behooves skippers of steamships to keep more than an ordinary watch out when in the neighborhood of the banks and to watch on the temperature of the water. So far no accidents from ice has been reported, but as the annual curtain of fog gets thicker about the Grand Banks the utmost caution will be necessary to avoid collisions with these most dangerous derelicts.

EASTER Canadian Magazine. The tin'd picture and colored cover of the Easter Canadian Magazine are attractive and indicate the rapid development of colour printing. To issue a good magazine in this country was not long ago considered an impossibility, on account of the limited extent of our population. The Canadian Magazine has proved the incorrectness of this impression, and is now showing that Canadian engravers and printers are keeping pace with the world's progress. The article on "The Burning of the Parliament Buildings" recalls a most exciting period in our history, and explains why Montreal ceased to be the capital of Canada. "From Quebec to James Bay," by E. T. D. Chambers, with the illustrations, shows the possibilities of great industrial and agricultural development in a region until recently thought uninhabitable. Norman Patterson's article on "Our Transcontinental Railways" gives a bird's-eye view of the transportation problem, which is well worth a close study. "Colonial Naval Reserves," by P. T. McGrath, is most timely in view of Canada's decision to establish such a force. In addition, there is a long poem by W. Wilfrid Campbell, and several stories, besides the serials and department.
