Fine R. A. F. Display Of Planes And Equipment Opened In Armouries

A large and keenly interested crowd of spectators attended the opening last night of the R. A. F. exhibit of planes and aircraft equipment. The exhibit, which was formally opened by His Honour Lieutenant Governor B. W. LePage, is being held in the armouries in connection with the Fifth Victory Loan and is one of the most outstanding features of the campaign. It is doubtful indeed if a better display could be seen in any part of Canada. The exhibit covers so much of the weapons matter and equipment with which the R. A. F. and R. C. A. F. works that it is a revelation to the average citizen.

Night In Woods Chills Prisoners

WINNIPEG, Nov. 1.—(CP)—Nineteen German prisoners of war returned to the fuel works at Park Road after an absence of more than 20 hours. They escaped early Sunday afternoon and were reported missing late last night. After a night in the woods, during which there was a heavy fall of snow, the men walked into the camp in groups today. "We got lost in the bush," they said.

Nazis Open Drive On 50,000 Greeks

ANKARA, Nov. 1.—(AP)—German forces are opening a full fledged offensive against the Greek islands in the Aegean Sea. The Germans obviously are seeking to take advantage of patriot disaffection and put down armed resistance in the islands. The German campaign, according to reliable information received here today, is being directed against the island group of the Col. Serenhis in Thessaly, and the rival Ege Army of Col. Zervas in the Aegean.

2,500 B. C. Miners Out On Strike

VANCOUVER, Nov. 1.—(CP)—Approximately 2,500 British Columbia coal miners went on strike today following a vote by the British Columbia Miners' Union. The strike is being called in support of the National War Labor Board in considering a request for wage increases. The miners voted to report for work beginning at midnight last night in support of the district headquarters.

Plane Missing With 4 Aboard

HALIFAX, Nov. 1.—(CP)—Four crew members of an R. C. A. F. twin-engine bomber have been listed as missing after their craft failed to return Saturday night while en route to a mission over the North Atlantic. The plane was a Liberator, and the crew consisted of Captain J. W. Patterson, R.A.F. navigator, W. Patterson (father), 12 Svalbard, Cumberland, Cumberland, and Sgt. Harold Seymour Fraser, wireless operator, Mrs. E. Fraser (mother), 64 Arctique St., Halifax. Sgt. Arthur Horton, wireless operator, 1000 St. John's, and Sgt. Errol A. Horton, brother-in-law, 1000 St. John's, N.S.

Death Of Former Island Attorney In Massachusetts

Word was received yesterday by Mr. J. J. Johnston, K.C., of the death of his brother, Mr. Richard E. Johnston, attorney of Boston. Mr. Johnston had been one of the leading citizens and public men of this Province for many years. He was a distinguished member of the Bar of this state and was delegated on more than one occasion to represent the Commonwealth at public functions abroad. Mr. Johnston was about seventy years of age and was a graduate of St. Dunstan's University. He studied law in Charlottetown with his brother, Mr. J. J. Johnston and the late Mr. W. O. Morrison. After being admitted to the Bar of this Province he was in partnership for some time with the late Hon. J. B. Bell in Summerside. He left here as a young man of thirty his last visit to the Island being about five years ago. His many friends here will greatly regret to learn of his passing.

British Destroyer Has Fine Record

LONDON, Nov. 1.—(CP)—Record of the destroyer Fearful, one of Britain's new warships, in her first year at sea. She has sunk two enemy submarines, helped to sink an Italian ammunition ship and an Italian destroyer, towed a damaged cruiser into British port; destroyed one enemy aircraft; rescued many British airmen; captured 30 enemy soldiers; towed a walrus afloat to safety and steamed more than 75,000 miles.

NANSAU, BARBADOS, Nov. 1.—(AP)—The defence agreed today that Alfred De Marigny made the fatal shot in the murder of a British subject in the room where the Canadian mining millionaire was slugged and burned last July.

War Situation Last Night

Heavy blows at German morale have been rained upon, Naidom with publication of the four-power Moscow covenant of war and peace and the accompanying declarations. The sweeping scope of the main document, announced yesterday, pledging China as well as Britain, Soviet Russia and the United States at war until such powers have laid down their arms on the basis of unconditional surrender, is breath-taking. It could leave even Japan, not specifically mentioned, in no doubt as to where Russia ultimately will stand in the global battle to end every war without saying that the Moscow declarations to Germany will be followed soon by similar Anglo-American-Chinese pronouncements of a similar nature, dooming Japanese military and political personnel responsible for war atrocities as the Churchill-Roosevelt-Stalin pledge dooms other Axis war criminals. Steps to that end had been taken in Washington, London and Chungking before the Moscow deliberations.

U. S. Coal Mines Are Seized By Government

WASHINGTON, Nov. 1.—(AP)—President Roosevelt seized the United States' coal mines again tonight and called on every miner to return to work by Wednesday morning. The President's action came as strikes virtually paralyzed the mines. He authorized Interior Secretary Harold I. Ickes to enter into a collective bargaining agreement with the miners and to conclude a contract for the duration of government operation under the approval of the war labor board. In a statement issued at the same time as the executive order taking possession of the mines, the President declared "for some time we have not been producing the coal which we need to fight the war." "As President of the United States and as commander in chief of the armed forces," he went on, "I call upon every miner to return without a day's delay to the mines." The President said that the mines will be opened by the Government Wednesday morning. "Every miner will be expected to be at his post of duty, ready to work for his government."

N. S. Man Kills Wife, Then Self

WILLIAMSDALE, N.S., Nov. 1.—(CP)—His throat slashed, 50-year-old Watson Campbell died in the attic of his farmhouse here shortly before searchers found his wife's body beneath a woodpile today, and a coroner's jury decided tonight the prosperous farmer and lumberman had killed his wife and committed suicide.

Allies Decide To Speed War Effort

MOSCOW, Nov. 1.—(AP)—United States and British delegates to the tripartite conference of Secretary of State Cordell Hull, Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden and Foreign Commissar Vyacheslav Molotov agreed tonight that results of the historic meeting surpassed their most optimistic expectations. I did not see Molotov but I saw Hull and Eden after they signed the declarations. The 72 year old Hull, who made his first airplane flight to attend the conference, looked pleased. Eden was jubilant and no secret was made of the fact he considered the Moscow conference to use a British phrase, "a pretty considerable result."

Reds Trap Nazis In Crimea

LONDON, Nov. 1.—(AP)—The Red Army trapped tens of thousands of Germans in the Crimea today by cutting the railway to them, and Moscow announced tonight that one fleeing enemy group north of the Peninsula had been surrounded, losing 2,000 killed and 6,000 captured in a continuing battle of annihilation.

Allies Plow Ahead In Mud

ALGERIA, Nov. 1.—(AP)—The Allied 5th and 8th Armies, laboring forward in mud and rain, have captured 21 more Italian towns and villages, including Teano, in grim fighting at the approaches to the Germans' massive new transportation defence barrier. Teano, important road junction 10 miles northeast of the enemy's towering Mount Massico stronghold, falls to Gen. Mark W. Clark's 5th Army after a one mile uphill fight against elements of the crack Hermann Goering Division, a headquarters communique announced today.
