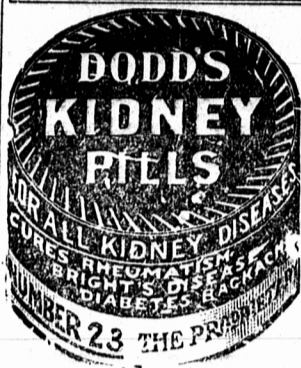

OF SPECIAL INTEREST

WASHINGTON, D. C., July (Special)—The agreement between the Republic of Guatemala and an American syndicate for a \$25,000,000 loan will have to be re-framed as a result of the direct agreement reached between President Cabrera and the representatives of the British bondholders for the settlement of their claims. The re-framing of the British claims was one of the main features of the former loan agreement.

This re-framing of the agreement probably will require several months. ST. LOUIS, Mo., July 23 (Special)—Miss Christine Fischer, who had slept uninterruptedly for 150 hours, following a tannin match, regained consciousness yesterday at the Jewish Hospital.

Miss Fischer made the following statement:—"I was awfully tired. My work as a school teacher has been most wearing, and for a month I have felt as though I could sleep a million years."

"I went out on the hot tennis court Monday afternoon, and when I went to dinner I sat on the edge of the bed to rest myself.

"Suddenly I felt myself going, sinking, sinking, and I must have fallen asleep then, for I can remember nothing more.

"It's just six days taken out of my life, that's all. I don't feel anything unusual, but I do feel greatly refreshed now, though I'm very weak. The doctors say I will be all right in a week or so, and won't feel any effects of the sleep."

BOLOGNA, July 23 (Special)—The arrest yesterday of Morozzo della Rocca, of the Italian War Office, who is accused of selling military secrets to Austria, is likely to prove a more complicated affair than was originally expected.

His arrest followed disclosures made at the inquiry into the suicide in May of Colonel Alfred Redl, chief of the general staff of the Eighth Army Corps of the Austrian army. Redl killed himself when it was discovered that he had been selling Austrian military secrets to Russia. According to the Italian authorities, Morozzo della Rocca was involved in the spy system.

Excavations are now being made under the garden wall of the house where the former Italian War Office official lived at Cervia in an endeavor to find secret documents which have disappeared.

HONG KONG, July 23 (Special)—Though it is believed that Kwang-Tung's independence will be short lived, all the steamships and trains to Hong Kong are crowded with refugees. Business has almost been suspended. The merchants of Hong Kong, who were the backbone of the first revo-

lution, are not supporting the present movement. They are disgusted with the whole business.

The government at Canton is practically without funds as the result partly of wholesale official corruption which was disclosed recently. Consequently popular support of the Governor's declaration that the Province has seceded is withheld.

General Chan, the Governor, charges President Yuan Shi-kai with having committed twelve crimes. These include the contracting of a loan and neglecting the Russo-Chinese treaty on Mongolia, with the possible abandonment of outer Mongolia.

British troops are proceeding to Snamene for the protection of foreigners.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 23 (Special)—In view of the gravity of the revolution among the southern provinces against the Peking government, and the important diplomatic complications now confronting China in regard to the sovereignty of Outer Mongolia and of Tibet President Wilson will probably appoint the new Minister as speedily as possible, so that he can proceed to his post without delay. Since the resignation of Mr. William J. Calhoun, of Chicago, the Legation at Peking has been in charge of Mr. Edward T. Williams, the Charge d'Affaires.

FINANCIAL TENSION FELT IN WEST MORE THAN EAST

FREDERICTON, July 21.—That the west is feeling the present financial tension much more than the east is the opinion expressed by Dr. W. C. Kierstead, who has just returned from a tour of six weeks through the Canadian west. Dr. Kierstead is the professor of political economy at the University of New Brunswick, and while in the west he made a careful study of conditions as they exist, comparing the west with the east.
