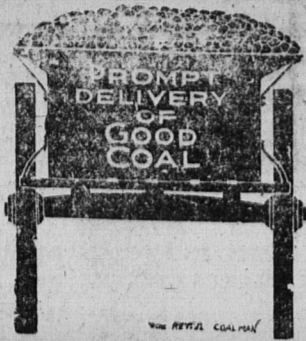

PATRIOTIC FARMERS' INSTITUTE.—The Strathcona Farmers' Institute, Hazelbrook, has adopted a prisoner of war. This is the first institute to take up the work. Many Women's Institutes and other organizations have adopted prisoners, but up to the present the Farmers' Institutes have not been heard from. It is hoped that now others will follow this good example. It only costs \$4.50 per month to supply a Canadian prisoner of war with six boxes of goods. Canon Simpson, Treasurer of this Fund, will be happy to give full particulars. One hundred and ninety-three prisoners are now provided for in this province.

CONCERT AT SANATORIUM.—A most successful and enjoyable innovation was introduced at The Dalton Sanatorium on Tuesday night when a party of ladies and gentlemen motored from the city and entertained the soldier inmates to a first class concert. The concert was organized by Mr. Watkis, and there was a ready response from the musical talent and the auto owners to convey them from and to the city. Among the singers were Misses Hazel Bremner, Margaret Kelly, Mamie Smith, Love, White, Messrs P. Stanley, E. Saunders and E. G. Beers. Mrs. Tait, Miss Maud McLean and Mr. E. Shaw gave readings, while the accompaniments were played by Miss Kate Stanley and Mr. Watkis. The soldiers and officials were loud in their manifestations of pleasure at the endeavours made to give them a pleasant evening, and the hope was expressed on every side that such entertainments would be given weekly. Mr. Watkis has agreed to organize weekly concerts, and he invites vocalists, cloutonists, and musicians willing to give their services occasionally to communicate with him in order that he might be able to arrange a weekly program. The autoists have entered with enthusiasm into the scheme, and on Tuesday night Messrs W. K. Rogers, John R. Dennis, W. A. Gaudet and Dr. Beer lent their cars.

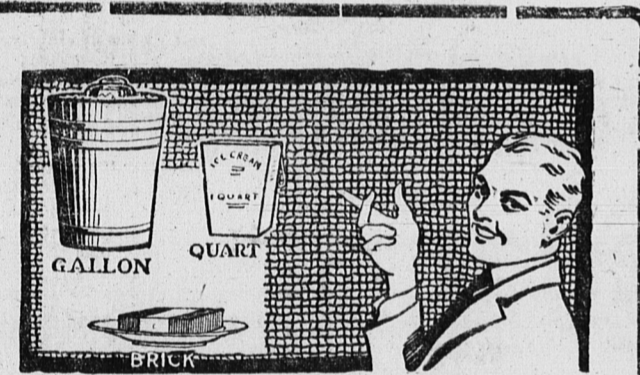

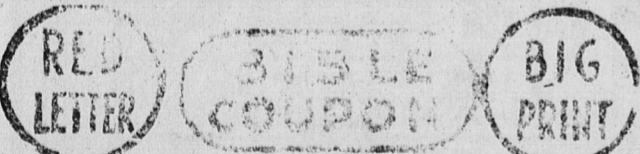
