Moncton Defeats St. Mary's 9-4 For First Win In Eight Starts

HALIFAX, Jan. 5.—(CP)—Moncton Hawks won their first game in eight starts here by smothering first-place St. Mary's 9-4 tonight for their second straight Maritime Senior Hockey League victory.

Shifty Lou Milani, Moncton winger, continued to be as hot as a firecracker by firing three goals and helping on two more to widen his league lead in both these departments. He now has 45 goals and 78 points in 47 games.

It was the second straight loss at home for the slumping Saints who lead Saint John Beavers by one point and play last-place Amherst Ramblers at Amherst tomorrow night. With 48 points Hawks trail Beavers by 12 and lead Ramblers by 35.

Halifax was weak in every department, particularly defensively and in goal. Regular netminder Jack Donnelly, back after an eye injury sidelined him for three games, was off form. But Moncton earned the win with their aggressiveness and fine defensive play.

St. Mary's were never in the game after Moncton took only 30 seconds to break their opening goal in the fifth minute of play and went ahead 2-1 three minutes later. Seek National Group To Promote Canadian Sport

 OTTAWA, Jan. 5.—(CP)—Seeking to establish a national organization to promote all kinds of sport in Canada, representatives of most sports-governing bodies tomorrow will confer on problems loaded with contention.

Delegates probably will find themselves faced with decisions on these tricky topics:

1. Question of federal subsidies for sports facilities and for assistance to some particular sports.
2. Sunday sport, thrown into the limelight by Toronto's recent vote in favor of Sabbath games and subsequent repercussions among the country.
3. Future of Canadian Olympic participation, criticized after Canada's mediocre showing in the last Olympic games.

The conference will be the second held by the national sports governing bodies. Last year it was attended by representatives of the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada, the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association, and spokesmen for everything from skiing and tennis to football and fencing.

The federal subsidy question has shown the most signs of argument for the 30-official delegates expected to attend.

In a brief presentation to the cabinet last September by a delegation headed by J. H. Ross of Calgary, chairman of the conference, the sports-governing bodies asked for money for two purposes.

They sought \$10,000,000 to be spent during the next three fiscal years for provision of facilities for amateur sports in Canada. In addition, they urged that \$300,000 a year be made available to national sports bodies for development, coaching, and expenses involved in certain amateur sports such as field meets and regattas which can raise only meagre funds because of small gate receipts.

Cabinet took no action on the proposals, which had been strongly opposed by some representatives at the first conference of sports-governing bodies last January.

Evidence that the subject still will meet opposition came here a few weeks ago when Clavens Campbell, president of the National Hockey League.

Addressing the Canadian Club in Ottawa, he strongly opposed any form of government subsidy and warned the government to keep "hands off" sports of any kind.

His contention was that natural public incentive to assist sport would be killed if taxing bodies became involved.

While Sunday sport was not on the agenda, there seemed little possibility it would escape attention in view of the current controversy on the subject.

Chamberlain Fined \$20

SYDNEY, N.S., Jan. 5.—(CP)—Murphy Chamberlain, coach of Sydney Millionaires of the Cape Breton Senior Hockey League, today was fined \$20 for his part in a squabble at the Sydney Forum last week. Sydney captain Don (Red) McRae was fined \$10 by league president C. Roy MacDonald.

Chamberlain hopped onto the ice to protest a goal by Glace Bay Miners. He claimed the puck hit the post and didn't go in. It required two cops to lead the fiery mentor away.

The fines were the fifth and sixth paid in the league this season and more may be on the way. Previously, Jim Ross and Johnny Myketyk of Millionaires, Eddie Bolan of Miners and Grant Hall of North Sydney Victorias paid fines following misconduct penalties.

Tonight, referee Frank Mallinson handed Mr. MacDonald a report on a post-game fracas at Glace Bay last night. Elliott was stopped en route to the referees' room by a uniformed member of Miners and later was reported to have been held by the sleeve by a non-playing member of the club.

Apparently the big change in the Giants, famed as a power-hitting outfit lacking speed, was the acquisition of shortstop Alvin Dark from Boston Braves in a winter trade.

"That Dark was the man we wanted in our big deal with the Braves," said Leo. "Stoney didn't come into it until the Braves asked for Sid Gordon. Gordon still figured in the plans of the New York Club, and we had to get something for our money then."

Canadiens In 5-3 Victory Over Bruins

MONTREAL, Jan. 5.—(CP)—Centre Billy Reay fired two goals and assisted on a third in a third-period upsurge that gave Montreal Canadiens a 5-3 victory over Boston Bruins tonight in a National Hockey League game that marked Canadiens' 40th anniversary in professional hockey.

The victory was the first of the season for the Montrealers over the Bruins after four losses and three ties. It boosted Canadiens into a second-place tie with New York Rangers.

Maurice Richard scored his 24th goal of the season, counting in the first period on Glenn Harmon's pass. Leo Gravelle followed two minutes later on Ken Reardon's pass and then Paul Ronty on a close-in backhand shot scored for the Bruins.
