See latest news, first of all.

Gordon Purdy, Amherst, has returned home from a visit to Charlottetown.

The tide will be high this morning at eleven and tomorrow morning at eleven fifty eight.

Anthracite coal is now selling at \$6 per ton. On October 1st there will be an advance of 25c. Householders should bear this in mind.

The trip to Tatamagouche by the steamer Harland on Monday was greatly enjoyed by all present. At Tatamagouche about 4000 people were assembled at a big Liberal picnic, which was addressed by Messrs Fielding, Murray, Pearson, Warburton, Haszard.

Among the outward passengers from this City yesterday were Ernest Lane to Tant'n. Mass, Harold Messervey to King's College, Windsor, Miss Lois Taylor to Mt Allison College, Sackville, Rev Dr Graham to Toronto, Bradford and Mrs Webster to Tanton, Mass, C. L. Grant to New Glasgow.

The Guardian has received from William Moran, proprietor of the Union Commercial College, a handsome gold plated medal in shape of a six pointed star with a background of a wreath of maple leaves. The centerpiece is a gold circle inclosing a representation of a bicyclist on his wheel. This medal was presented by the U. C. C. for the fifth prize in the Guardian Bicycle Road Race that took place on Monday, August 30th, and was won by Walter Mullins of this City. Mr. Mullins should certainly feel proud of the handsome medal that he will become the fortunate possessor of.

On complaint of Inspector Jenkins the officers raided the premises of John McMurrer, Royalty, on Saturday afternoon. When the officers arrived on the scene they found the doors locked. This was not an insurmountable difficulty, however, and on continuing in their endeavors they were rewarded by the discovery of an upturned beer cask on a pile of seaweed. The odor of the seaweed was decidedly emphatic in its proclamation of the probable percentage of the moisture deposited thereon. The police also came upon bait in the form of sour beer but they were not in a mood to be bothered with trifles and did not bite.

An adjourned meeting of the City Council was held last evening. Present—Councillors—Rogers, Riley, Reddin, Campbell, Lane, McDonald and Stewart. A communication was read from the attorney of M. P. Hogan alleging that a claim for damages for expropriation of his land on Spring Park Creek was ignored by the Council. His worship the Mayor stated that no such request had been made to the Council, and that this was the first intimation he had of the matter. On motion the communication was referred to the Recorder for his opinion. Councillor Leman moved that a new sidewalk be placed on Admiral Street, and, after much discussion, this resolution was passed. Council adjourned.

The election petition of L. P. Tanton vs L. E. Prowse came up yesterday morning, for continuation before the Chief Justice and Justice Fitzgerald. John A. Mathieson, K. C. and A. A. McLean, K. C., appeared for the petitioner and the Attorney-General and J. J. Johnson, K. C. for the respondent.

The first witness called was Sheriff Coombs, who produced the accounts of the financial agents of Mr. Warburton and Mr. Prowse. The next witness was Arthur W. Weeks, Mr. Warburton's financial agent, who swore that the only amount he received was the \$200 deposit paid by him for Mr. Warburton, and he stated that the joint account of both Liberal candidates was kept by Mr. Prowse's agent, G. J. Rogers. The following witnesses were examined—J. McDonald, Robert Shaw, A. Morrissey and Maynard Rodd. The last named witness, in the course of his testimony, admitted having received payment from Mr. Prowse's agent for the hire of two horses on election day. The court adjourned until ten o'clock this morning.

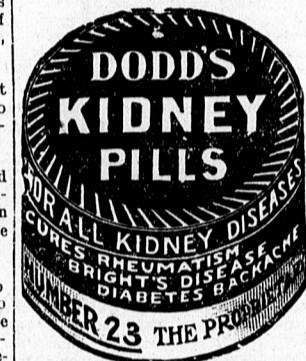

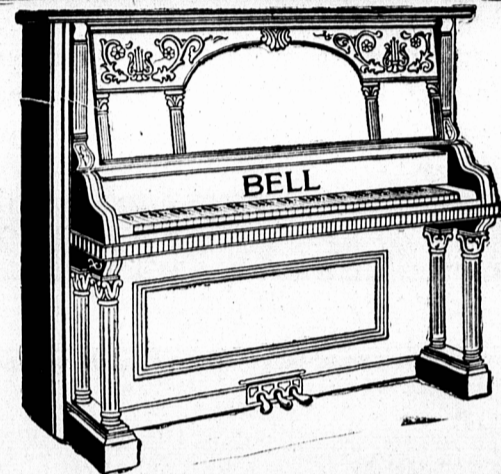
