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JAPAN'S REPRESENTATIVES MAY MEET RUSSIA IN PARIS

The Latter is Awaiting Terms—Japan will Demand the full Fruits of Her Victory and the Placing of Oriental Peace on a Permanent Basis—Meanwhile Hostilities Continue in Manchuria.

TOKIO, June 11—(Special.)—Japan has shown her willingness to appoint plenipotentiaries to meet the Russians and to negotiate peace, but it is premature to think that this will lead to an ultimate conclusion of peace.

An armistice will probably be arranged. President Roosevelt is generally thanked for his efforts to bring about peace between the belligerent powers.

TOKIO, June 11—(Special.)—The following has been received from Manchurian headquarters: "On June ninth in the morning we drove the enemy from the northern heights of Liang Shutehuan and Nanchengtsu and occupied these positions."

THE CLOSING OF PARLIAMENT

Now Set Down for the Middle of July—An Amendment to Inland Revenue Act.

OTTAWA, June 11—(Special.)—The closing of the session is now set down for July 15th. The Inland Revenue Act is being amended to permit distillers buying malt wherever they wish instead of being compelled as at present to manufacture it on their premises.

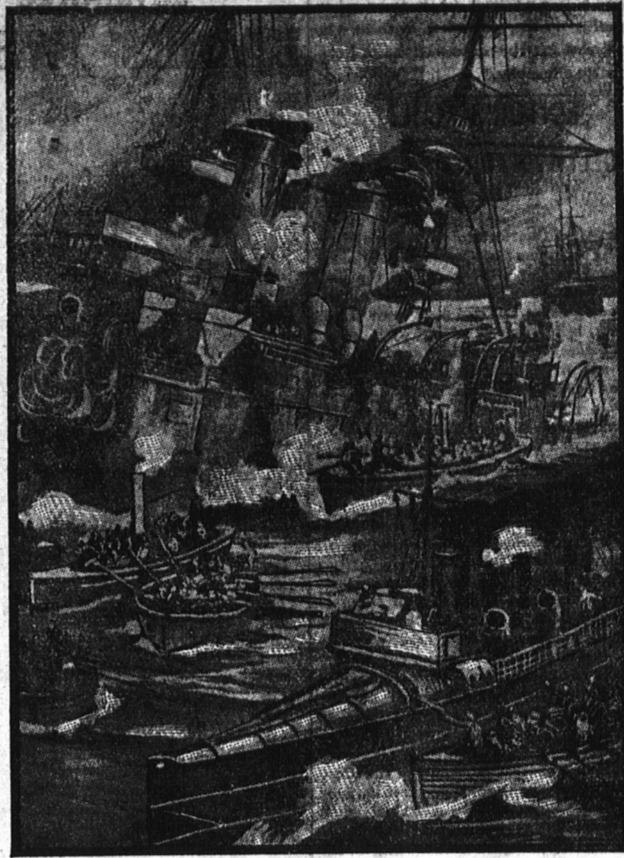
CELEBRATED HIS 90TH BIRTHDAY

IMPROVED GAS ENGINE INVENTED

Which it is Prophesied will be a General Means of Propulsion in the Near Future—Small one has a Successful Test.

ST. JOHN, June 11—(Special.)—Dr. J. E. March has invented an improved gas generating engine in which Sir Hugh Allan has prophesied will be a general means of propulsion of steamers within comparatively few years.

A test has been made of a five horse power engine and a much larger one will now be built. Then if satisfactory a company will be formed. The invention is regarded as a most important one in marine engineering.

The Premier thinks that the Riksdag will adopt this view and is convinced that no foreign power will recognize Norway as an independent country against the will of Sweden.

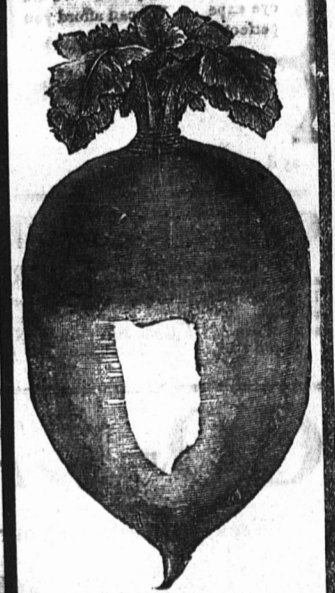
He was one of the finest of the old residents of Cape Breton. His son is a Professor in Toronto University.
