SOME LOBSTERS.—Lobsters are unusually plentiful on the North Shore of the Province and, although the weather has not been invariably favorable, large catches have been made and the packers are kept very busy. A representative of The Guardian visited the factory of Messrs Peter McNutt and Son at Malpeque this week and was given ocular demonstration of the immense business that is being done in just one of the many factories along the North Shore. Supplying this factory are 22 boats and the daily catch for last week averaged 4,000 pounds. Last Monday, when owing to the heavy gale only the inside traps were overhauled, the catch totalled 4,200 pounds. Had all the traps been visited it was estimated that the catch would have been close to 6,000 pounds. This factory is equipped with every modern convenience and is kept in scrupulously sanitary condition. A feature of this season's operations is the prevention of waste. The meat in the legs of the lobster, hitherto regarded as not worth the trouble of extracting, is now utilized, being taken out by means of a patent roller device recently invented. This factory is managed by Mr. Fred Beaudet, formerly of Stanley Bridge, who knows all there is to know about lobsters and how to pack them. His staff of 26 operatives is at present kept busy handling the exceptionally large catches.

FIRE BRIGADE BUSY.—The Fire-Brigade have lately been kept "on the move," a good deal, and during Monday and yesterday they were called out no fewer than three times. At about noon on Monday an alarm was received at the station by telephone that there was a fire at Upton Park, and several firemen immediately set out for the scene in a couple of motor cars. They were there in a very short time but fortunately their services were not required, the people of Upton Park having smothered the fire, such as it was. It was found that the roof had in some manner become alight, and the flame was instantly attacked with buckets of water. I

It is stated that the fire was the outcome of certain painter's operations on the roof, which the use of torches was necessary. The Brigade deserve every credit for the splendid efforts they always exert to maintain their standard of efficiency. The damage to Mr. Coombs' home is estimated between \$1,500 and \$2,000, the damage being principally interior.

With deep regret The Guardian records the death of Donald Charles Martin, eldest son of Stipendiary Magistrate K. J. Martin and Mrs. Martin, which occurred yesterday evening at 5 o'clock. The deceased had been in failing health for some time and in November last, on the advice of his physician, went to the Sanitarium at Saranac Lake, N. Y. The change did not benefit him perceptibly and he returned home about a month ago. Since then his condition was such as to cause no immediate alarm and the hope grew that at least a measure of health would be granted him. This hope was suddenly and unexpectedly dispelled yesterday afternoon when a turn came, death following almost immediately. He was conscious to the last moment; he met and recognized the grim messenger, met him bravely and resignedly and entered calmly and painlessly upon his eternal rest.

The death of his firstborn, in his twenty-first year, just as he was entering upon what, humanly speaking, was a career of more than ordinary promise and usefulness, is a crushing blow to the mother and father who had looked forward to the fulfillment of the brilliant promise of his school and college days, for he was an exceptionally bright student, a young man of sterling character, upright, manly and lovable. After graduating from Prince of Wales College he taught school for a year at Stanley Bridge, purposing to take up the study of law later, but in the mysterious dispensation of Providence the mapped-out course was changed by "the gift of death." In their great sorrow Mr. and Mrs. Martin and the surviving sister, Miss Jean, and brother, Mr. Kenneth Martin, Teacher at Binbury, have the sincere sympathy of a large circle of friends.

RIFLE NEWS.—The inter-maritime rifle watch will be shot at Charlottetown on June 11, as mentioned in a previous issue of The Guardian. A committee composed of the following has been appointed to select the team and make all arrangements for the match: Major W. A. Weeks, Major J. A. Jones and Capt. D. A. McKinnon. Militiamen desirous of shooting in this team are asked to get in some practice immediately and are particularly requested to be present at the rifle range next Saturday during the first league shoot. The first shoot of the Canadian Rifle League will be held on Saturday next at 2 p. m. Teams have been entered from both the Fourth Regiment and the Charlottetown Rifle Club.

MILITARY FUNERAL.—The funeral of Mr. Donald Charles Martin takes place to-day from his father's residence, Weymouth street, at 2 p. m. As the deceased was a member of the Fourth Regiment of Artillery, his comrades-in-arms will accord him a military funeral. Members of both Nos. Three and Four Batteries of the Fourth Brigade, with the Band, are therefore requested to parade at the Drill Shed to-day at 11 o'clock for the purpose of attending the funeral.

CONFEDERATION PAINTING.—The Publicity Agent, Mr. J. E. B. McCready, has received a letter from one W. Edgar Kaitlions, a painter, who has forwarded the photograph of an historic painting which he states he made depicting the Canadian Confederation. This picture was hung in the large mail office of the Canada building at the World's fair, St. Louis, 1904. The painter thinks the painting would make "a fine and appropriate setting for the back of the speaker's stage or platform or in the Hall" of the House. He offers to dispose of it.

DEEPENING GOVERNMENT POND.—For some time now citizens, and specially those resident in the western part of the town, have been waiting with some patience to see the work of deepening and beautifying Government Pond commence. It will be recalled that early in the year the City Council awarded the contract for the work of dredging the pond to a man named Trainor, and it was intended that the work should be done by May 24th, but up to the present nothing has been attempted towards getting the contract carried out; the original contractor having relinquished the contract, and some difficulty having been found in getting someone else to undertake it. Negotiations, however, are now being made with another party for the performance of the work and it is hoped that before long the pond will be deepened and its surroundings beautified. The reason for the deepening of the pond is that there is a desire to make it available for the use of canoes. Besides, in connection with the Confederation Celebration next August, it is intended to have an encampment of Indians included in the exhibition side of the celebration, and this camp, it is proposed, should be pitched on the banks of the pond, and the Indians can then make use of their canoes on the pond. Of course, the pond will be available to other canoeists.
