Late Czar's Valuables Offered at Auction

(Special to The Guardian.) NEW YORK, Feb. 26.—Jewels, furs and paintings, believed to have belonged to the late Czar of Russia, which the customs authorities seized, will be sold by auction today. The man who attempted to smuggle them into the United States said he bought them from Russian revolutionists soon after the raid on the Winter Palace at Petrograd.

NEW YORK FUR SALES NEW YORK, Feb. 25.—With a grand total of \$10,600.00 for the nine days of selling the annual winter fur auction in the Masonic Hall here ended today.

It was by far the largest sale of its kind ever held in this city, today final figures exceeding the Grand total of the fall sale here by more than \$3,000.000. Bidding for nutria, beaver, raccoon and skunk featured the final sessions of the sale. Nutria advanced eighty per cent, over fall prices, while beaver and south western furs went up seventy and sixty per cent respectively. Top price for beaver \$64. Skunk sold up to \$12.25. More than one hundred and ten tons of rabbit skins from the antipodes were sold. Hatters rabbit went up 35 per cent as compared with prices at the fall sale of the New York fur and goods corporation, while medium furrier rabbit advanced fifteen per cent. The best grade of the latter did not change.

SHIPPING NEWS

STEAMER MONTCALM AT NORTH SYDNEY

The Canadian Government steamer Montcalm arrived at North Sydney yesterday, all well. She is just back from Magdalen Islands where she took provisions and mails. She was six weeks making the trip from Souris, P.E.I., to Pleasant Bay, Magdalen Islands, she having been caught in ice floes and held captive. It is expected the Montcalm will remain at Sydney for a few days, then proceed to Halifax where she will go into Dry Dock for repairs and overhauling.

MINISTRY ON SHIPPING

A Montreal exchange says: The British Ministry of Shipping (Canada) which during its five and a half years of existence practically controlled the export trade of Canada, inland and overseas, clearing over 3,000 liners from Canadian ports and a Portland will be demobilized in March 31 next, according to an announcement by its Director-General, Sir Arthur Harris between 1914 and 1919 in excess of 16,000,000 gross tons of munitions, was material and supplies, were moved inland and overseas.

NEW TRAWLER SOON READY FOR BANKS

A Yarmouth exchange says: The new steam trawler Bernard M., built by Captain Y. T. LeBlanc, at Wedgeport, and which for the past few months has been at the New Burell Johnson Iron Company's docks, having her engines completed, is now so nearly completed that it is expected she will make her trial trip in a week or so. The Bernard M. is a thoroughly equipped trawler in every particular. The captain's chief engineer's and officers' quarters are beautifully finished in Douglas fir, while the crew's quarters under the forecastle head are large, airy and bright.

The Bernard M. is also fitted with large engines, capable of developing over 700 horse-power, and constructed of the same patterns as those installed last season in the steamer Bras d'Or. They are supplied by steam from a Scotch boiler of the size of which was the capacity of the new Burell Johnson Iron Company's boiler shop. Her deck winches and other fittings are practically all complete, so that by the time she is fitted for her trial she will in a few days after be ready to go into commission.

The Bernard M. is owned by the Wedgeport Steam Trawling Company, Limited, of Wedgeport, which was recently organized with a capitalization of \$225,000. The present officers of the Company are: President, Capt. J. E. Kinney, Yarmouth; Manager, Captain H. T. LeBlanc, Wedgeport; Secretary, Dr. A. A. Deckman, Bridgetown, Captain Clayton Morrissey, who for years has the distinction of being one of the greatest fish killers sailing out of Beaton of Gloucester, is a prominent stockholder, and will be in command of the Bernard M. which fact alone should ensure the success of this new enterprise.

FTON TEACHERS ARE DEMANDING LIVING WAGES

Necessities of Life have Increased 200 Per Cent. While Their Advance in Wages Has Been 25 p. c.

FREDERICTON, Feb. 24.—Declaring that the necessities of life have advanced from 200 to 300 per cent during the period that their pay has been increased not more than an average of 25 per cent, the teachers in the Fredericton schools at a meeting yesterday signed a demand for larger salaries which will be presented to the Board of School Trustees. The delegation will ask for an immediate increase, and will point out that their pay has not by any means kept pace with the steadily advancing cost of living, so that now more than ever before their remuneration is not commensurate with the services rendered.
