Troops From 3rd Division Land On English Soil

Huge convoy makes uneventful voyage; Well-equipped troops join Canadian Corps; Island men in Contingent.

SOMEWHERE IN ENGLAND, Aug. 1—(CP CABLE)—Adding thousands of men to Canada's overseas army, troops of the 3rd Division have poured into this camp for a day and a night as special trains hustled them away from the trans-Atlantic debarkation port.

The men, comprising part but not all of the 3rd Division, arrived at a British port after an uneventful crossing in one of the largest convoys ever used on the Atlantic and guarded by Canadian and British warships.

The 3rd Division will join the Canadian Corps, now one of the most powerful military formations in Britain and trained to play a major part in repelling any invasion from German-occupied Europe.

BERLIN, Aug. 1—(AP)—German dispatches from the eastern front claimed today the destruction of tens of thousands of Russian troops trapped south of Smolensk, along with the capture of 35,000 prisoners and 235 cannon, but at the same time admitted that a second Red force was yet to be finally dealt with northeast of the city.

(By Henry Cassidy, Associated Press Staff Writer) MOSCOW, Aug. 2—(Saturday)—(AP)—Capitalizing on German inability to maintain a solid front along the 2,000-mile fighting zone, the Red army is knitting in gaps between Nazi units in disruptive flanking attacks, particularly in the hotly-contested Smolensk sector, Soviet dispatches said today.

As an example of this technique against the tenuous German lines, the crack 99th Red army division was credited with ripping to pieces three German divisions within an unspecified period, these dispatches said.
