The city properties are assessed for about \$33,000 and with the other properties it is said that the purchase price was between \$40,000 and \$50,000.—St. John's Telegraph.

J. McKenzie, encoired; Scotch reading, "Getting after the Minister's Wife," Mrs. L. M. Montgomery; reading, "Tom O' Shanter," John F. McNeill; address, Robbie Burns—Rev. Geo. E. Ross; closing song—Auld Lang Syne. Walter Simpson occupied the chair, and gave a short address on Burns at the close of the program. A vote of thanks moved by Rev. John Stirling and seconded by J. A. Clark, and supported by M. Coughlan, was tendered to those who took part. The address by Rev. Mr. Ross was an able and eloquent appreciation of the life and work of the immortal bard. The different parts of the program were all well presented and heartily applauded.
