Hotel Guests Register of Clothes Pins

HALIFAX, N. S. Aug. 19.—In a little low-roofed inn at Comeauville on the trunk highway where it follows the "French Shore" in Digby and Yarmouth counties, there is to be found what is probably a hotel register unique in the world. In this hostelry, known for its homely atmosphere, the guest is given a common wooden clothespin of the old fashioned type, and an indelible pencil. He writes his name on the pin and it is hung on a wire rack along with the hundreds of others that accumulate there during the year, registration being more a matter of curiosity than compliance with the law. The wire is stripped every New Year's day and the pins distributed among the neighbors for keepsake except great personalities have put their names in which case they are retained as souvenirs. Last year the proprietress had 800 clothespins for distribution.

NEW YORK, Aug. 17.—Plans for the amalgamation of three of the largest British bank institutions in Africa, the Colonial Bank, the Anglo-Egyptian Bank Limited and the National Bank of South Africa, Limited, are announced in a cablegram received here. The new institution will have an authorized capital of £10,000,000, of which £2,500,000 will be issued and subscribed and £4,025,000 will be paid up.

Grant—a practical printer and a company consisting of gentlemen supporting the Conservative party, the late Mr. Blake Irving and others furnishing the editorials. Upon the departure of Mr. Grant for Boston, Mr. P. R. Bowers succeeded to the management; and the late Mr. Justice Fitzgerald became the chief contributors to its editorials. On the first of June, 1873, Mr. W. L. Cotton was appointed manager and editor of the paper. The paper was purchased from Mr. Cotton by Mr. R. H. Bowers and later he formed a joint stock company, and proceeded on the 28th day of May, 1877, to issue the first daily newspaper published in the province. For many years he was both manager and editor of this newspaper. The double duty increased with the years, growing too onerous. Mr. Archibald Irving became business manager, and after him Messrs. F. C. and R. L. Cotton successively attended to the business affairs of the company. In the year 1914 the goodwill of the Charlottetown Business College and later was employed with the firm of Hazard and Gaudet, also other firms in the United States where by her efficiency and ability she won the respect of all her employers.

Ottawa May Be Seat Of Cardinals

MONTREAL, Aug. 18.—The Montreal Gazette prints the following special despatch from Quebec: "Ottawa, the capital of Canada, may also become the permanent seat of Cardinals in this part of North America, if reliable information available here in religious circles is confirmed. 'It is said that His Grace, Mgr. Ennard, Archbishop of Ottawa, will be called to the Sacred College in December next, succeeding the late Cardinal Beaudry. 'Though Quebec has been the seat of the Roman Catholic Church in Canada and notwithstanding the fact that two Cardinals in succession were chosen from the diocese, it is said that the fact that Ottawa is the capital, and that the Apostolic Delegate is always located in that city is prevailing with the Vatican. 'Associated with this report is one to the effect that two Cardinals might even be chosen in Canada, and that if such is the case, His Grace, Mgr. Mathew, of Regina, would be appointed for Quebec.'"

FIND AKHENATEN STATUE
