BUSINESS IN THE JOYS OF ROYAL COURTS YESTERYEAR

(Canadian Press) LONDON, Nov. 7.—Not in the life of the present Royal Courts of Justice have so many actions for the breach of promise of marriage been entered for any single sitting as for the Michaelmas term. Five is a fair average but this year there are 20 and in one the defendant proposes to conduct his own case.

The three probate, divorce, and Admiralty judges have a total list of 903 cases, of which roughly, 865 are matrimonial cases. The undetected cases number 673. The number of husbands petitioning for divorce outright is 345, as against 466 wives.

WILL MAINTAIN PRODUCTION AND LABOR

Manufacturers From Coast to Coast to Co-operate With Government Authorities.

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, Que., Nov. 6.—Firm in the belief that if Canada is able to weather effectively the storm of depression and unemployment this winter, marked economic progress will be recorded by 1932, leading industrialists of the Dominion pledged themselves today to an intensive fight on behalf of the jobless.

To the fore in the battle against unemployment will be a policy of "maintenance of employment," by which all industries, whenever possible, will maintain production and labor.

The decision was reached when the executive committee and council of the Canadian Manufacturers Association met here today. Present were leading manufacturers from coast to coast, W. H. Miner, of Grinby, Que., President headed the contingent.

Debate on the Dominion's economic and industrial outlook was continued all day, with four main decisions being made.

1.—Canadian manufacturers will fight unemployment by maintaining industrial production wherever possible, and as many men as possible.

2.—The services of manufacturers from coast to coast will be enlisted to work with the Dominion, Provincial and municipal governments in order to ensure the use of Canadian products and Canadian labor in all public works undertaken through the federal unemployment relief plan.

3.—The Dominion and Provincial Governments will be asked to restrain the spending of money voted for unemployment relief on road-building, and to use it mostly on public works, thus assuring skilled labor of employment.

4.—Canadian manufacturers applauded the new Australian-Canadian trade treaty, and hope earnestly that a similar treaty will be negotiated with New Zealand.

GHANDI MEETS KING GEORGE

(Canadian Press) LONDON, Nov. 6. (A.P.)—Wearing a loin cloth and shawl, Mahatma Gandhi attended a formal reception yesterday at Buckingham Palace and stood before the King.

It was the first time the little Indian Nationalist Leader, who claims to represent 80,000,000 untouchables and 300,000,000 other Indians, met His Majesty and he seemed to like it immensely.

"The King and Queen were most friendly and gracious," he said. "I also liked the Prince of Wales."

The Prince had come by aeroplane from Liverpool to attend the state tea party at the palace, to which about 600 guests were invited.

Before the function was half over, Mr. Gandhi left the palace, for he professes to have no liking for social gatherings.

The Mahatma, in his appearance before the King, comported himself with the oriental placidity that is so strong a factor in his character.

When the King, dressed in morning attire, offered his hand, Gandhi shook it heartily, and, after bowing reverently, raised both his hands in front of his chest in the manner of a Buddhist priest—the most decorous form of Indian greeting.

LUMBER FIRE HEAVY LOSSES

(Canadian Press) ST. FAUSTIN, Que., Nov. 6. (By the Canadian Press)—Fire of unknown origin which raged for ten hours destroyed over a million feet of birch lumber and three hundred cords of slab wood at Perley's Sidings near here yesterday. Most of the lumber was the property of the G. M. Strong Company, lumber merchants of Montreal. One of the company officials who came here stated that the damage had not yet been estimated but that the loss was partly covered by insurance.

The fire was discovered by a motorist who was driving near the siding. The volunteer fire fighters were handicapped in their long fight by the poor supply of water in the village.

A Growing Problem

(Canadian Press) LONDON, Nov. 7.—"Another mother-in-law case!" exclaimed a Leicester probation officer. "They are increasing rapidly and getting worse. It is nothing to have fifty wives at my house in a week where there is disagreement with mother-in-law"—which suggests that the mother-in-law problem, for years treated as a jest, can have in it the elements of tragedy.

The Editor of "Sketch" comments it is, however, as absurd to draw deductions regarding mother-in-law from the cases which come before a probation officer, as it would be to base conclusions on marriage as an institution on the records of the Divorce Court. We could all quote cases of well beloved mother-in-law who are the warm allies of their sons and daughters by marriage. And it does not seem to occur to those who have made grandmother a term of affection and the mother-in-law one of reproach that it is impossible to become the one without being the other.
