A PICTOU Despatch of Nov. 22nd, says:—Was it murder? That is now agitating the minds of the people of Pictou concerning the poor fellow Mann, who was found dead on the track. The coroner's jury have been twice adjourned so as to elicit all the facts in connection with the investigation. On the night of the tragedy three or four fellows were with Mann and some were drinking. There was also fighting going on and it is said Mann's life was threatened. One woman says she can swear she heard a man crying for mercy. The story goes that the poor fellow might have been pummelled to death and left on the track to convey the idea that he had been killed by a train. The man was sober and the fact that a pool of blood was found a considerable distance from the place creates suspicion. So far the authorities have made no arrests. The coroner adjourned the jury till next Monday.

PORT OF HALIFAX.
