THE THREE DISGRACES.

Self-interest, Injustice, Lawlessness, these three and the greatest of these is self-interest.

We hear much, these days, of injustice, the oppression of the poor, the miscarriage of justice in our courts of law, the prevalence of crime; we read of lawlessness at public gatherings, on our railway trains, on our streets. We hear little and read less of the moving spirit behind the injustice and the lawlessness. That moving spirit is self-interest.

Self-interest is the largest factor in our commercial, our political, our civic and even in our professional and social life. The man who sheds manly tears over the fate that threatens his beloved (?) country, if it should fall under the malign power of the other party, is usually more concerned about the rake-off in some piece of political jobbery than in the fate of the British Empire.

When an act of lawlessness is committed by a miscreant his friends who want to use him for their own political, civic or social ends, fly to his rescue, endeavor to shield him in the courts and even go so far as to pay his fines—if his vote or his influence is sufficient to justify the outlay. This is neither through love of the miscreant nor through any sympathy with lawlessness but for what they hope to make out of the transaction.
