LOCAL BRIEFS

Latest News of the City and Province.

By Reporters and Correspondents Everywhere.

SPRINGFIELD NOTES.—Union Division is in a flourishing condition and hopes to be soon the banner division. The division has installed the following officers for the ensuing year:—W. P. S., Ira McKay; O. S., John Matheson; P. W. P., Archie McKenzie.—The farmers are preparing for haymaking and the crops are looking well in this part of the Island.

SUNDAY school work of our country is making great strides in many directions, not the least of which is the Summer School. This is a school held in the Summer for about a week for the training of Sunday-school teachers. Prominent instructors are engaged, who are specialists in their line, to deliver lectures, and to teach how to teach. These Summer Schools are usually held under the auspices of State Sunday-school Associations. This year Pennsylvania holds five schools of about a week each in different sections of the State. Kentucky, New York, New Jersey, Massachusetts, Colorado, Illinois and Tennessee, and probably other States have held or will hold a Summer School this year. Some are held in connection with Chautauquas and Assemblies, and form an important part of their programs. Sunday-schools are coming to recognize that they need trained workers, and are using every effort to bring this about.

If Prince Edward Island did not receive a visit from the army worm the people of British Columbia are agitated over the serious outbreak of an injurious species of one of the insects, commonly known as cut worms, which is now doing untold damage in British Columbia. Thousands of these pests are attacking almost all kinds of vegetation. Much damage has been done to tobacco, tomatoes, potatoes, cabbages and all kinds of garden plants. Even fruit trees have not escaped this destructive pest. At present it is impossible to say the amount of destruction this insect is causing, as it has not reached its full growth. When full grown the caterpillar measures about two and a half inches in length. It is then a very voracious feeder. Many letters have been sent to the division of entomology at the Experimental Farm as to the best means of checking the ravages of this pest. A large number of the cut worms themselves have also been sent in, and these are being bred to maturity for purposes of study.

WHILE people in the Province of Prince Edward Island, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick are accustomed to hear from Western sources glowing estimates of grain crops which are rarely if ever realized, and although we therefore "discount" the free expressions of the hopeful and happy western man, we are not lacking in sympathy with him when he is sincerely disappointed. This year, owing to drought, the wheat crop of Manitoba will be small. Rains, arriving late, say at 1st of July, did much to save the wheat in certain districts, but in other places it is hopeless. Great variation is shown in different parts of the province. When the rains came, the sanguine ones declared that there would be more than a half crop, but later and calmer estimates reduce this figure. An experienced buyer, who had visited Western and Southern Manitoba up to July 10th, thought it safe to average the province at 8 bushels per acre; but the Commercial of 21st dwells upon the "uncertainty." Late grain crops, however, will make feed at any rate, which will be welcome on account of the scarcity of hay. Reports from the country vary very much, some asserting that wheat will not go more than five bushels per acre, while some report ten and even fifteen bushels per acre. The crop is very irregular, and this in part will account for such wide estimates. Even this year there are carefully cultivated fields of wheat which will give a fair crop, while in the same district a considerable area is a failure.—Ex.

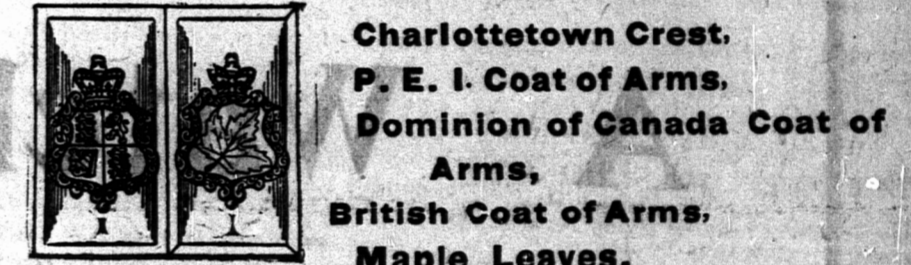
