NEW YORK, March 16-(AP)—Stocks, led by steels and blue chips, put on a nice little rally today after considerable early hesitancy. Canadian Pacific, International Nickel and Lake Shore gained fractions in a generally-quiet Canadian list. Lake Shore was off 1-8. The Associated Press average of 60 stocks was up 3 of a point at 347, best comeback since March 3. Transfers totalled 315,310 shares against 339,393 Friday, another one of the smallest turnovers since last June. Prominent share gainers included Du Pont, Dow Chemical, Union Carbide, Westinghouse, U.S. Steel, Bethlehem, Youngstown, Shear, Philip Morris, American Telephone, General Motors, Douglas Aircraft, Consolidated Aircraft and Loew's. Rails were narrow but most held their own as carrier managements moved to fight the O.P.A. petition for postponement of recently boosted freight rates on certain commodities. Up moderately were Santa Fe, N.Y. Central, Western Union, General Electric, Sears Roebuck, Kennebec, Pepsi-Cola and American Can. Unchanged to down a shade were Chrysler, Allied Chemical, Southern Pacific and International Harvester.

Base metals netted a small gain on the strength of Hudson Bay, up 1-4 to 24 1-2, and Falconbridge, up 15 cents to 3.05. British American Oil weakened 3-8 to 13 1-2 and prices were down narrowly for Canada Steamships pfd, Canadian Car, Imperial 70 and United Puel B. The Massey-Harris issues were fairly active. The old preferred gained 1-4 to 33 1-4 and the gold common was up 10 cents to 170. Livestock

MONTREAL, March 16-(CP)—Cattle receipts on the Montreal livestock market totalled 613, it was reported today by the Department of Agriculture. Calf receipts reached 712 while sheep receipts were 26 and hog receipts totalled 50. Cattle were estimated to be barely steady. Calves were close to 1.50 lower than the close of last week. Lambs and hogs were firm. Steers ranged from \$6.75 to a nominal \$7.00. Good steers were from \$10 up and medium up to \$10. Good heifers sold around \$9 to \$9.50, medium \$8 to \$8.50 and common down to \$6. Medium cows were \$6.75 to \$7.50, good cows around \$8. Canners and cutters were \$4.50 to \$5.50. Good bulls made \$8 to \$8.50 and medium \$6.50 to \$7.50. The calf market was again lower and sales of plain to medium calves were estimated to be close to \$1.50 lower than the close of the week. Good quality veals made \$12 to \$12.50 with two selling up to \$13. Medium veals were \$10 to \$11.50 and common light veals sold as low as \$8. The bulk of the calves were sold in mixed lots between \$9.25 and \$9. Grassers \$5.50 to \$6. Two carloads of calves were bought on the market for shipments to the U.S.A. Culls and buck lambs were steady at \$1.50 flat. Sheep were from \$4.50 to \$7. Hogs were steady at \$15.35 to \$15.50 for B-1 dressed. Grade A drew \$1 per hog premium with discounts on off grades. Sows were \$8.50 to \$9.25 live weight.

ATTENTION FARMERS

The following regulations have been enacted by the Wartime Prices and Trade Board governing the sale of Farm Machinery:— "The minimum cash payment required on time sales is now 40% of purchase price. Where any trade-in is taken by dealer the allowance for same is to be first deducted from the purchase price and the cash payment computed as 40% of the balance. Full settlement must be made by purchaser on or before time of delivery, either in cash or at least 40% cash and signed notes for balance. No machine can be delivered without being settled for. Purchasers are required to take delivery at dealer's place of business or their own railway station, or pay an additional charge for direct delivery. Machines cannot be delivered and left on trial. Settlement must, in all cases, be made on or before delivery."

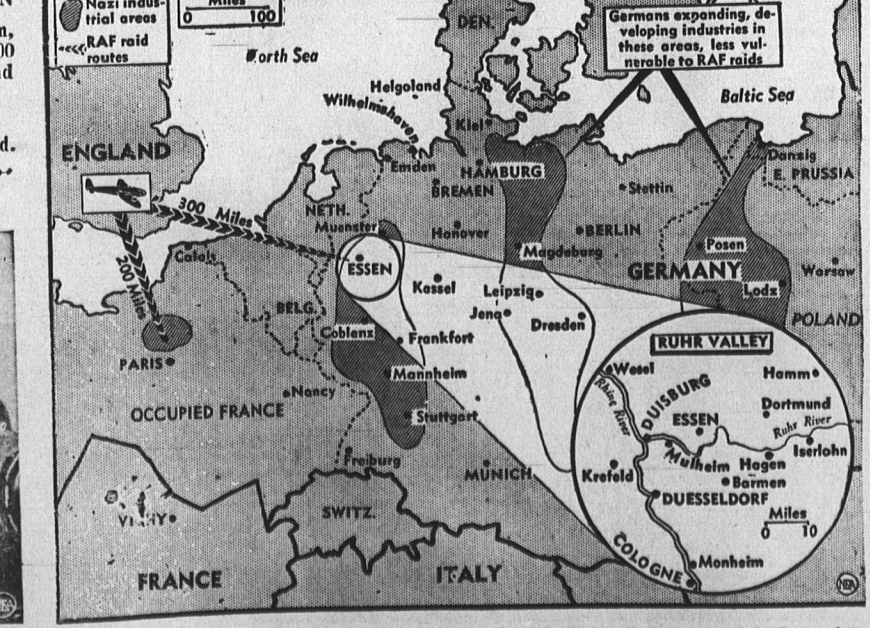

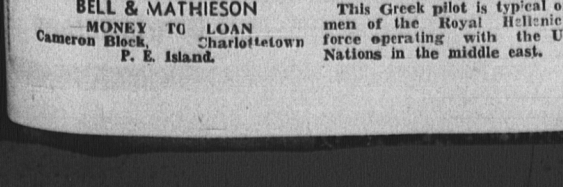
