

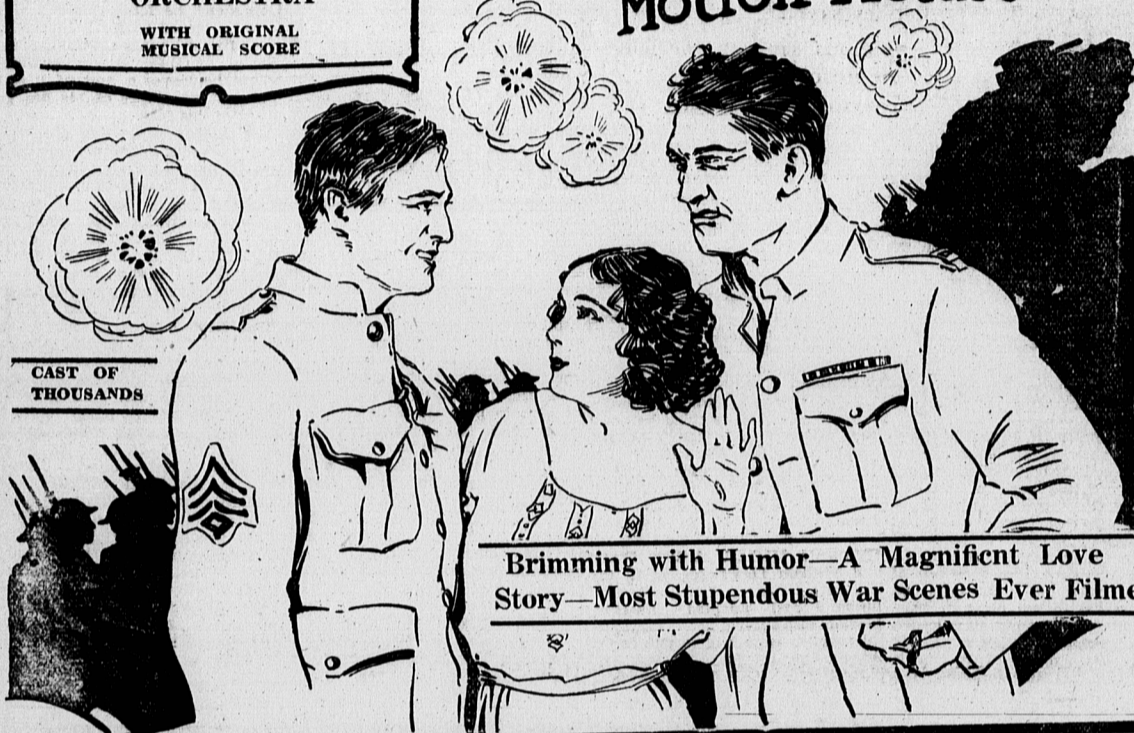

GREAT FOOTBALL EXPERT BECOMES NEWSPAPER MAN

Charles M. Buchan Is Joining The Sporting Staff Of Daily New s-Westminster Gazette.

LONDON, Eng., May 19--Charles M. Buchan, the famous English international football player who is joining the sporting staff of the Daily News and Westminster Gazette, and will begin his journalistic duties in June, is no newcomer to the profession of writing for the press. His daily football lessons in the Daily News and Westminster Gazette during the past season are regarded as having provided the best tuition ever given by a well-known footballer in a newspaper. He has shown clearly how the game should be played, emphasizing the finer points, and developing the possibilities for all budding aspirants of the fundamental advice he has given.

Charles Murray Buchan, who is retiring from active football, was born at Plumstead in 1891, and entered senior football while still a pupil at the Woolwich Polytechnic Secondary School. The tales of his prowess in those early days make his development into one of the finest players in modern football only a logical sequence. He assisted the Arsenal while still at school, and, after playing in the Kent league, became a professional at the invitation of Leyton. In 1911, before he was 19, he signed on for Sunderland with which club he remained for 14 seasons. Before coming south again as captain of the Arsenal in 1925, he had scored over 200 goals. The number he has inspired in other forwards is legion. To see this tall, angular figure dribble the ball down the field has become one of the chief delights of the game. Buchan has played in four international matches, and last year led the Arsenal in the Cup Final, his first appearance in the final having been for Sunderland at the Crystal Palace in 1913. His ability as a strategist is equalled only by his powers as a team builder, and it is in him that Arsenal have found the lever to lift them out of the dangerous position in which they found themselves three years ago.

LONDON, May 19. The romantic marriage of a peer's son to a barmaid in Jersey, Channel Islands, has just been revealed. The marriage took place last July, but the strictest secrecy has been observed. The bridegroom, who is 36, is Otway Randal Plunkett, son and heir of Lord Louth. He was married on July 4 at St. Saviour's Church, Jersey, to Miss Ethel Molly Gallacher, of St. John's Road, Jersey, who was formerly a telegraph messenger and latterly a barmaid at a local hotel.

Lord Louth has himself been married three times, present wife whom he married two years ago, was Lady Prichard-Jones, widow of Sir John Prichard-Jones, of Anglesey and Elstree, Hertfordshire. Helpful Hints And Recipes

Plum Pudding--One lb. raisins, 1 lb. currants, 1 lb. suet, 3-4 lb. bread crumbs, 1-4 lb. brown sugar, 1-4 lb. flour, 1-2 lb. candied peel, 1-2 pint fruit juice, 6 eggs, 1-2 teaspoon mace and cinnamon, 1 teaspoon ginger, 1-2 teaspoon grated nutmeg. Boil 6 hours and steam 2 more at time of using.

Cheese Straws--1 pint grated cheese, 3-4 pint flour, 2 tablespoons butter, a little salt. Mix with water, roll out and cut in strips about 6 inches long. Bake a light brown.

Caramel Custard--Melt and brown very carefully 1-4 cup sugar add a pint of scalded milk, beat 3 eggs slightly, add a small teaspoon vanilla and a pinch of salt. When sugar has melted in the hot milk, turn slowly over the beaten eggs strain and pour into buttered cups. Set in pan of hot water and cook until, when tried with a knife, it comes out clean. Serve with this sauce--Brown 1-2 cup sugar, add 1-2 cup hot water and cook 10 minutes.

To make yeast with yeast cakes take a cup of flour and mix with a little water, until smooth, then over it pour 2 qts. boiling water. Stir thoroughly together, add a pint of mashed potatoes, 1-4 cup salt, 1-4 cup sugar and let stand until lukewarm. Then add 1 yeast cake that has been soaked for about 5 minutes in tepid water. Put mixture in a warm (not hot) place for a half day and keep well covered. Use a dish deep enough to allow liquid to rise. This will be ready for use in ten hours.

A good furniture polish can be made with linseed oil, 1-2 pint, vinegar 1-2 pint, turpentine 1-2 pint, spirits of wine 1-2 pint, butter of antimony 1 oz.

Never wash your lamp chimneys, hold them over a steaming teakettle, then polish with a soft, dry cloth.

Just a pinch of soda with tomato juice prevents milk curdling, when added.

To extract onion juice press, run slice of onion against a grater, move it slightly and let juice run off point of your grater.

Remember when baking that 2 cups lard, equal a pound, also 2 of butter the same, while 4 of flour are needed for 1 lb.
