or they were not, it is hard to conceive that they were ignorant of the facts. If they had the facts, why did they select this American concern and spend the public money buying American goods when they could be bought just as cheaply, and of a quality, it seems, superior, from a Canadian factory employing and paying two hundred returned men, some of whom were cripples?

Mr. Stewart said these were heavy loads of this material, the government knew of that were manufactured in this material. They asked for prices and the tenders were the same. The second tenders were also the same. Of course the engineer was supposed to be a fair judge of this material, but the commissioner would naturally be expected to be. The department had already some experience with one of the companies when culverts were furnished last year. A large culvert was installed by this company a few years ago and it was still in good shape, so they gave the order to the people who had already given satisfaction.

Mr. Stewart—if my hon. friend had gone a little further into the matter he would have found that the Public Works people are supplying the culverts in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick and to the rail-ways throughout Canada right through to British Columbia and they have given satisfaction for over twenty years.

Hon. Mr. Crosby—if we were to go down to the office and produce the testimonials from the other company they would be found to be just as strong. Their culverts are being sold through the Dominion too.

Mr. Stewart—Supposing this matter in a way that we thought was in the best interests of everybody.

Mr. Stewart—Is that in our best interests to let our good Canadian money go out of the country?

Mr. Crosby—We thought we were serving the country.

Mr. Stewart—An analysis of the materials will prove that they are doing no such thing.

Mr. Crosby—The analysis don't amount to a hill of beans. I might say there is a great difference of opinion as to the value of the composition. Some claim that it is a great advantage and some claim that it is a disadvantage.

Mr. Stewart—And you give the benefit of the doubt to the American firm.

SEND SCOUT TO U. S. TO STUDY DRY LAW—A commissioner will be sent by the state of New South Wales, Australia, to learn the truth about prohibition in America, according to an announcement by Premier Dooley. Upon the report made by the commissioner the government of the state will then act on prohibition measures here.

EXCHANGE OF PULPITS—The Rev. M. J. MacPherson, of New Glasgow, and Rev. J. M. Murdoch, of Malpeque, will exchange pulpits on Sunday, April 30th.

MR. RAYNOR WINS LAWSUIT—The Court of Appeal of Nova Scotia yesterday handed down judgment in the case of B. I. Raynor, of Summerside, Appellant, vs. Andrew B. Clark of Bridgetown, N. S., respondent on April 28th, allowing the appeal with costs and dismissing the action of the respondent in the lower court with costs.

The suit was in connection with real estate and taxes, and involved \$15,000. Mr. W. K. Bentley, K. C., and Attorney General Johnston, were counsel for Mr. Raynor, who won the suit.

LEGISLATURE—In the Legislature yesterday the resolution for the completion of the wide gauge and second car ferry was put through. The bill to incorporate the Electric Spark Intensifying Co., and the Dairy Association bill were given second reading. The Prohibition Act Amendment Act Amendment bill came up and after being read by the Premier with another bill of the same name, which he had also promoted and apparently forgotten, the bill went into committee. Some of the clauses caused considerable discussion and it was finally decided to report progress and adjourn the House which accordingly adjourned until 3 p. m. Monday.

GUARD OF HONOR FOR CLOSING—It is expected that the closing ceremonies of the Provincial Legislature will take place early next week—probably on Tuesday. The 1st Battalion, 10th Battalion (C.E.F.), The Prince Edward Island Regiment, Lieutenant Colonel Cecil Stewart, M.C., commanding, will furnish a Guard of Honor of 100 all ranks, with Regimental Band, to be in attendance at the closing of the Provincial Legislature by His Honour the Lieutenant Governor. The Guard will be under the command of Captain Thomas Rogers, "A" Company, 1st Battalion. Clothing and equipment will be issued at the Regimental Armouries this Friday evening.

FIRE AT IONA—The many friends of Mr. Chas. McLaughlin, of Iona, will regret to learn of the serious loss, which he has sustained; when on April the 19th his splendid new dwelling house was completely destroyed by fire. It appears from a report from a friend in the chimney that the fire first started in the roof, and as the wind was blowing a hurricane at the time, it soon spread, and was beyond control, before help came to the residence, however, in a very short time a large number of men and boys arrived at the scene and only by the most heroic efforts did they succeed in saving Mr. McLaughlin's Mill house, barn and other out buildings and also the farm buildings of the nearby neighbors, as burning chimneys had Mr. Farrell's garage almost a hundred yards distant. Mr. McLaughlin's loss is a heavy one, as hardly an year of his household effects were saved, and it is understood that the building was very lightly insured at the time. Mr. McLaughlin has suddenly bereft the wife and little ones is surely a case which calls for the sympathy and kind hearted assistance of the whole community.

The maximum amount is \$2000 for each building.

FOX BREEDERS' MEETING—The meeting of the Directors of the Canadian Silver Black Fox Breeders Association was held in Summerside on Thursday the 27th of April. Messrs. McRae, Arkell, Hitchman and Brant of the Canadian Records Department, Ottawa, were present. At the suggestion of Col. Mackintosh the following was added to rule 7: "That if a fox of more than four generations of breeding is registered under rule 7, as a four generation fox, the pedigree as recorded cannot be amended or altered at any future date. Carried. Further suggestion was made that the progeny of foxes that have been registered must be registered under rule 7. The fox registered must be tattooed with the breeder's initials and number in his ear. Carried. The rule to the naming of animals was amended to read that only immediate sire and dam required to be named when registered. Carried. The regulation for the registering of litters was changed to read after January, 1923, and the actual registering of litters must be completed before July 1st, 1923. Carried.
