He looked down at her, suddenly grave-eyed.


"I saw that, just now," he said significantly. "Was Canby annoying you?"

Business Operations Show Advance Cycle

MONTREAL, Que., Nov. 7.—Business operations have shown a steady advance since February, 1929, the lowest point reached during the present retrograde business cycle which began during the latter part of 1929, states the Industrial Department of the Canadian National Railways. The month of September, this year, shows a gain of 35.5 per cent over February. Manufacturing records a gain of 36.3 per cent during the same period. Flour production for the month of August, 1933, latest figures available, as compared with February shows a gain of 108.8 per cent.
