THE MARKET.—The market yesterday was largely attended, and although farmers are very busy harvesting, quite a lot of produce was brought into the city. Potatoes are quoted at 35 cents wholesale, while butter shows a wide variety of price, from 22 to 25 cents for dairy. Eggs are quoted at 23 and 24 cents. Early apples are now being brought in in large quantities, although the crop this year has only small. The majority of people who place apples on the market have no idea whatever of the way in which they should be handled. They bring the apples in bags, making it almost impossible for the dealer to get anything out of them, as they spoil so quickly. Retailers state that it is simply a waste of time to bring in apples for sale unless they are hand picked and properly packed in boxes. They state that in many cases they have to throw the apples out as waste, owing to this very fact that they are not properly handled and graded. WILLIAM PERRIN KILLED BY LOCOMOTIVE IN TRURO RAILWAY YARD. TRURO, Sept. 22.—A shocking accident occurred at Truro to-night, at 5.29 o'clock, when William Perrin, about 40 years of age, lost his life. Engine 420, which brought in No. 20 train from Sydney, was backing up to the roundhouse, and Perrin, with a companion, named Dobson, was crossing the plank walk which is used in passing over the tracks from the station to Victoria Park. They apparently did not notice the engine which was sounding the usual danger signals. It struck Perrin, and falling upon the rails, his head was severed from the body, and the body otherwise mutilated. Strange to say, Dobson, who was also struck, fell clear of the wheels, and was uninjured.

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WINTER CLOTHING FOR THE SOLDIERS

OTTAWA, Sept. 23.—Canada's soldiers will not suffer during the coming winter from wet and cold feet as they did last winter. A new issue of boots, two pairs to each soldier is being sent out to all the overseas force of whom about 50,000 are now in France and 23,000 still at Shorncliffe. The new boots are pronounced by experts to be superior for active service conditions to any now in use by the Allied armies. They are warm, water proof and excellent wearing qualities. Last winter the men had only one pair each, ill-adapted for use in wet or cold weather, and the severest hardships of the men came from their inability to keep their feet dry or warm. Immense quantities of winter clothing and equipment of all kinds are now going forward from Canada for the men at the front. Since the first of this month ten million pounds of clothing etc., have been handled by the Quartermaster General's Department. The winter equipment problem involves looking after not only the 33,000 men who have already crossed the Atlantic, but also the 50,000 or more men who will be kept in training in Canada during the winter. Every effort is being made to secure from the contractors prompt delivery of the necessary clothing supplies for which requisitions were forwarded by the Department last June to the Government's purchasing commission.

PLAN TO DIRECT AEROPLANE WITHOUT PASSENGERS BY WIRELESS.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 23.—Henry Ford the Detroit manufacturer, has undertaken to demonstrate to the navy department that gasoline is available as a motive power for submarines. Mr. Ford will begin his work on behalf of the government, Thursday morning at the Brooklyn navy yard, where he will make a descent in a submarine, by arrangements perfected for him today, by Secretary of the Navy Daniels. In addition to his efforts to adopt gasoline as a motive power for the undersea boats, Mr. Ford, it was stated today, has evolved a scheme by which aeroplanes without passengers may be directed and used by wireless as practically self-acting engines of war.

FREIGHT TRAFFIC STOPPED IN BULGARIA.

ATHENS, Sept. 20.—Advises received here from diplomatic sources are to the effect that freight traffic has been suspended on the Bulgarian railroads since last Saturday. For five thousand Bulgarians in Macedonia and Thrace have been called to the colors. The leader of the Agrarian party in Bulgaria is declared to have threatened King Ferdinand with a revolution if the alleged Germanophile policy of Bulgaria was continued. The King is reported to have replied that the Government was pursuing the policy which best served Bulgaria's interests. BULGARIA MOBILISING

(Special to The Guardian) WASHINGTON, Sept. 21.—Bulgaria has ordered mobilization. According to Berlin dispatches received today the Bulgarian troops are concentrating along the Serbian frontier. Serbia has declared the Serbia-Hungarian frontier a closed war zone and is preparing to meet the expected Bulgarian invasion. German troops are massed along the Serbian boundary, co-operating with Austro-Hungarians, according to press despatches. The Vienna press attach the greatest significance to Sofia despatches reporting the Duke of Mecklenburg, acting Kaiser, having conferred the Iron Cross on Czar Ferdinand of Bulgaria.

MISER'S WILL WAS PLEASANT SURPRISE.

OKLAHOMA CITY, Sept. 22.—When Enos Nichols died at Shawnee nearly four years ago it was not known he had any great wealth, but as he had left some property it was necessary for an administrator to take charge. In an iron-bound trunk under the miser's bed he found \$250,000 cash and government bonds. The trunk also contained a will giving the estate to Mrs. Harriet Nichols Cook, a niece, who lived in New Jersey. She died two years ago, before coming into possession of the property. A recent court decision gives the property to her heirs, but the case will be appealed to the Supreme Court by Oklahoma relatives of Nichols. The will left by Nichols also given \$150,000 to friends at Barry, Ill., but it is separate from the \$250,000 he left in this state. The will was drawn at Barry Ill., by Major Kline an attorney, and it was witnessed by Major Kline's widow, who testified as to its authenticity in court recently at Shawnee. Another will left by Nichols had been probated before the will in favor of Mrs. Cook and her heirs, but placed before the court. It had been identified as the last will of Nichols, but one witness testified she had sworn falsely and did not witness the signature of Nichols to the will. Judge Charles C. Watts, appointed a special judge by the Supreme Court to hear the case then declared the will giving the property to the New Jersey heirs of Mrs. Cook was the only true will.

A PRINCELY GIFT FOR MCGILL

MONTREAL, Sept. 20.—Dr. James Douglas, New York, who is spoken of as a probable successor to the late Sir Sandford Fleming chancellor of Queen's University, Kingston, Ont., has offered a gift of \$150,000 to McGill University, Montreal, towards the cost of the erection of a students' residence. The board of governors of McGill held a special meeting today and accepted the proffered gift. Dr. Douglas is a member of the board.

FOUR CHILDREN BURNED TO DEATH.

LARGE, Penn., Sept. 24.—Trapped by flames which enveloped their home, while their mother was calling on a neighbour, four children of Daniel Wish, were burned to death here yesterday. The mother returned in time to find the entrance to the dwelling cut off by the fire and was seriously injured while trying to force her way through a window. The bodies of the children, who ranged in age from two to six years, were found near the beds from which they had been aroused by the fire.
