the spiritual flame which is the spirit of China, the spirit which will emerge from the ruins of the old and erect the structure of a new China. (BY C. Y. McDANIEL, Associated Press Foreign Staff) HAIKOW, Manchuria, July 7 (AP)—Twelve months of war have brought China disastrous defeats, staggering losses, bitter disappointments and the prospect of a greater distress in the year to come. The year has cost China 500,000 of her best troops, parts of 10 provinces, most of her coastline with its ports through which flowed revenue-producing goods. It has cost her control of two-thirds of her railroad mileage and her greatest channel of commerce, the Yangtze river—but it has not brought China to her knees. Few Chinese today honestly believe ultimate victory will be won by military successes on the battlefield. But China derives hope for the future from Japan's failure to obtain a local settlement after the peace negotiations ending last July 7, which would have assured Japanese economic and military domination of north China. The Chinese Nationalist Party, Kuomintang, is working as a unit under the leadership of General Chiang Kai-shek. After a decade of efforts to discredit Chiang and his government, the Chinese Communists, if not actually fighting side by side with the general's nationalists, are using their acknowledged abilities as skilled agitators and guerrilla fighters to prevent Japanese consolidation of gains in Shansi province. Without minimizing the seriousness of China's military losses, her spokesmen maintain China's policy of attrition is succeeding even while her armies are losing battles and territory.

ROOF TRIMMING

Now is a good time to trim the hoofs of cows that have been kept in the barn most of the winter. Unless the hoofs are trimmed they will often crack and break off during the spring and summer and lameness will result. Because of the abrasion and difficulty in moving the hoofs with broken hoofs show a decrease in milk flow. Use a sharp card-iron chisel attached to the end of a spring fork or shovel handle for trimming off the hoofs. The cow should be held and placed on a solid plank floor between two people. With a heavy mallet and chisel the surplus hoof may be easily trimmed off. Level off the bottom of the feet so the hoof hits the ground flat.
