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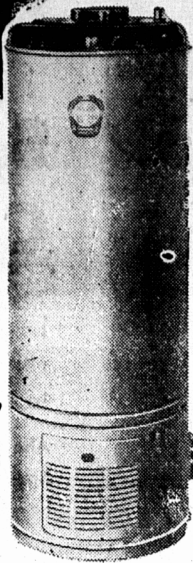

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In Memoriam

MR. J. LEAMING MURPHY

On the morning of April 7th, at his home in Millvale, there passed peacefully from this world the soul of Mr. J. Leaming Murphy. An illness of some months, spent in complete resignation to the Will of the Creator, ended with all the manifestations of that peace of soul which comes specially to those blessed with the privilege of receiving the last rites of Mother Church. A visit by his pastor, Rev. E. J. Dalton, preceded by a short time the passing of the deceased. Several members of his family were also able to be present at his bedside.

The deceased was born at Stanley Bridge in the year 1881, the son of the late John Murphy and Mary Jane Proctor. He attended Prince of Wales College and after graduating taught school for a number of years. In 1909 he married Alice Mae Carr and took up farming on his uncle's farm in Millvale. Possessed of a keen understanding and sound judgment, the late Mr. Murphy took an unusual interest in all matters affecting the welfare of his community, the Church, and his native province. He was tireless and most energetic even in his later years in the interests of any venture which he thought might improve, within his own circle, the social standards and economic status of the people of his own time and of those who would follow.

He leaves to mourn his sorrowing widow, four sons and four daughters; namely: Albert residing at Norboro; Oswald on the home-stand; Cletus on the teaching staff of Prince of Wales College, Clifford attending St. Dunstan's College; Patricia, Mrs. Louis Mulligan, Kinkora; Leona, Mrs. Elmer McCourt, Emerald; Bernice, Mrs. Vernon McCaull, Kinkora; and Theresa at home. Two children predeceased him in infancy. He leaves also ten grandchildren, four brothers and three sisters to mourn their loss.

The funeral on Wednesday morning, April 9th, to St. Ann's Church, Hope River, was largely attended. Requiem High Mass was celebrated by the pastor, Reverend E. J. Dalton. Present in the sanctuary was Reverend A. O. Murphy, a nephew of the deceased, who conducted the services at the grave. The pallbearers were the four sons and two sons-in-law of the deceased. Burial was in the Church cemetery. May his soul rest in peace.

Will Be Delay In Entering Mine Where 11 Died

MALARTIC, Que., May 4—(CP)—Search for the bodies of 11 hard-rock miners, entombed 11 days ago in the East Malartic Gold Mine, may be retarded until next week, mine officials said today when a snag arose in attempts to decontaminate the mine.

The content of carbon monoxide rising like a vapor to the surface increased overnight while water-baling operations were in progress. Officials said the draining process was stemming the upward flow of foul air from the No. 3 shaft. Deadliness of the gas makes it impossible for rescue workers to descend to the point between the 9th and 10th levels where an electrical pump will be installed. Pumps on the 10th level, where fire broke out April 24, are under water.

"If we keep skipping the water out, the flow of air stops," said D.M. MacLean, mine manager. "Both must come out and they're not coming up together."

Edward Futtterer, consulting engineer, described the water skimming operation as "a slow, exasperating process."

The weight of water falling back into the shaft from two buckets being hoisted at two-minute intervals is keeping the flow of air down, he said.

Mr. Futtterer said that to try to offset this snag it is planned to send rescue squads underground tonight to open valves in the air lines on all levels from the eighth up. The mine's compressors—still since last Saturday night when the miners were given up as dead—will be started again in an attempt to force the air to the surface.

The 11 miners are believed to be about 500 feet below the 10th level of No. 4 shaft, probably close to 2,000 feet underground. The mine fire claimed 12 lives all together but the body of the 12th victim was recovered.

Prairies Farmers To Use New Weed-killer

REGINA, May 4—(CP)—Prairie farmers are armed today with a war-born weed-killer—hailed by scientists as the answer to the main problem of land cultivation—in preparation for the battle against scoures which annually eat \$100,000,000 holes in Canada's bread-basket.

Next June they will use 2-4-D for the first time, spraying the herbicide from special machines. It is estimated 1,000 of the new turbine sprayers have been sold across the prairies within the last few months—300 in the Regina area alone to individual municipalities and small farmer groups.

Enthusiasm of cautious scientists for the plant growth regulator 2-4-D, has almost equalled that of farmers who have struggled against weeds since the first crop was sown.

Dr. T. K. Pavlychenko, head of the plant ecology laboratory of the

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University of Saskatchewan and one of the leading North American authorities on weed control, compares the importance of the discovery of 2-4-D with that of electricity. He says the turning point in the struggle has been reached.

In the evening the Minister spoke on the child "In the Christian Home." One of the important things about these services was that by the presence of families in such numbers to overflow the capacity of the Church there is evidence that men and women are really conscious about the necessity of spiritual nurture for their children and anxious to discover the best methods by which this spiritual nurture may be achieved and that fact itself ought to be a great inspiration to all those who are engaged in giving leadership and training to young people

with the Church. The Anthem "Lead Kindly Light", A. S. Sullivan was sung by the choir.
