EVANGELISTIC SERVICE IN CHRISTIAN CHURCH

Evangelist Lowell C. McPherson spoke last evening in the Central Christian Church on the subject, "The Power of Faith." He read a part of I Cor. 5, taking verse 7 for a text, "For we walk by faith, not by sight." In part Mr. McPherson said:

"The Holy Spirit does not teach the 'faith alone' doctrine as have many people. 'Faith alone' is not a Holy Spirit expression. The question was often asked of apostles and others by people, 'What must I do to be saved?' The answer by the Holy Spirit never was 'faith alone.' And when the jailor of Philippi asked the question he was told that faith in the Lord Jesus Christ would save him, but faith strong enough to cause sincere repentance expressed by his washing away the bloody stripes on the disciples whom he had beaten, and strong enough also to cause him to obey the Holy Spirit by being baptized the same hour of the night. No faith in Christ is strong enough that does not cause one to do all one can in obedience to Christ. True faith means action towards Christ and not refusing to do anything. Therefore Paul said 'We walk by faith.' People not having faith do nothing. The power of faith is sufficient to lay hold of God's promises, trusting He will fulfil them. Does any one know of God's never doing as He promises when the conditions He required were met? Never. And his conditions are not more than we can do. God does not prepare our food and feed it to us with gold spoons. But He provides us means of satisfying hunger. So will He provide for all spiritually who hunger and thirst after righteousness. Faith in God is not only working for Him but also with Him.

"Nor can any one have faith for another. We can rear our children in the nurture and admonition of the Lord, but otherwise God would not have us pretend to have faith for them.

"There are three general classes of religions in the world—Paganism, Rationalism and Christianity. Paganism is based on the senses, Rationalism on pure reason or cold logic, and Christianity on faith in the Christ of God. Paganism depends on images and idols, Rationalism on syllogisms, and Christianity on a faith in the Christ that trusts His promises. The more one depends on images and forms and ceremonies, the less one looks by faith to the unseen, spiritual and eternal. The more one always depends on head-logic without heart-trust the less of the Christ sympathy and love will be have, and therefore a heathen would never by such a one be converted."

Mr. McPherson spoke of the power of faith in commerce and society and government. This evening he expects to speak on "Full Repentance."

DRASTIC TEMPERANCE LAWS PROPOSED FOR MANITOBA.

WINNIPEG, Dec. 1.—A general cabinet meeting will be called about the order-in-council to secure the closing of all places where intoxicating liquor is retailed, at seven o'clock p. m.; to prevent the sale of liquor in social clubs after that hour, and to close all other places at six p. m. These measures are expected to be adopted by the license holders agreeing to close at the hours stated in the absence of a law to that effect. At the next session of the legislature a bill will be introduced amending the license act so as to permit the governor-in-council in times of stress or necessity to vary the hours during which liquor may be sold, and to give municipalities the right to regulate by popular vote the number of licenses to be granted. It is stated these changes will be made immediately.

STEAMER IS OVERDUE.

SYDNEY, N. S., Dec. 1.—Anxiety is felt in marine circles here about the overdue steamer Sharon which left this port November 9, bound to Newport, England, with steel products. No word has been heard of the ship since sailing.
