Weather conditions throughout the entire day were not of the best from a shooting standpoint. The morning had started with a heavy fog, which later switched to blinding sunlight. A mirage floated across the front of the targets, the shimmer making visibility very difficult at times. Then as clouds floated across the front of the sun, the light changed frequently. Added to that, a fairly stiff breeze swept across the ranges. But, through it all, the riflemen hung up some remarkable scores.
In the tyro match, first event of the meeting, eight men scored possibilities. Five were eliminated immediately after the match when all eight fired three extra shots, but after that was done, Sgt. H. D. Proctor, Kingston; Sgt. R. Staples, Saint John and Cpl. L. S. Vaines, Montreal, still were tied. They will battle it out later.
Royal Hamilton Light Infantry's officers team of four men scored a nice win in the Barlow Match, when they noosed out Governor General's Foot Guards, of Ottawa, by a single point, and Essex Scottish, from the border cities, made every post a winning one in the Lewis gun match.
But today's high light was the MacDougall Challenge Cup. The match is fired at 200 and 500 yards, with \$708 being distributed in prize money. Scarcely had the match started when possibilities became frequent. More than a dozen of them were hung up at the 500 yard range, but the short distance proved the hardest, and many leaders fell by the wayside there.

REFeree IS ATTACKED AT LOS ANGELES

Brazilian And German Water Polo Teams Disgruntled Over Decisions Made By Hungarian Arbitrer.

Los Angeles, Aug. 8.—Brazil's water polo team was disqualified from further participation in the championships of the 10th Olympic Games here today following their massed attack on Bela Komjadi, who had refereed their match with Germany. At the same time L. Da Silva, goalie, Serpa, left back and Branco, a reserve, were barred from further participation in the swimming events of the games.
OLYMPIC SWIMMING STADIUM, Los Angeles, Calif., Aug. 8.—A riot broke out at the Olympic plunge here late today when the Brazilian water polo team, protesting the decision rendered by B. Komjadi, Hungary referee of the game between the South American team and Germany's, attacked him in a body as the game ended.
Police and pool attendants rushed to the rescue of Komjadi, as fists flew and many German and Brazilian countrymen rushed past the guards to the pool edge. The game was won by Germany, 7 to 3 after repeated fouls had been called on the Brazilians and as many protests had been made by the South Americans.

Rowing Races Expected To Hold Stage This Week

Canada's Oarsmen Favoured To Give Good Account Of Themselves In Respective Contests.

Los Angeles, Aug. 8.—The Olympic Games had taken to the water today in search of "more records to break, swimmers, divers and water poloists holding forth before thousands at the Los Angeles outdoor swimming stadium while oarsmen prepared to get going on the morrow.
A crowd of 10,000 watched tow-headed Mickey Riley Gallitzen of the United States win the men's springboard diving title this morning. As many witnessed the triumph in the women's 100 metre free style this afternoon of Helene Madison, Seattle's great swimmer.
Alfred Phillips of Toronto was 4th, in the diving competition, Walter Spencer, veteran British Guianan, was the only Canadian swimmer able to reach the semi-finals of the 400 metre free style for men in the preliminary heats this afternoon and the Montrealer only got in because his time of five minutes and 10 seconds was faster than that of any other third-place winner.
Spence was third to "Boy" Charlton of Australia, who won in 4:56 4-5 with P. Costill of Italy second. Spence led for more than half the distance but could not hold the margin over the pair who finished strong.
George Burrows of Vancouver was third in his heat, but his time was 5:28 8-10 and only one third-place man could be given semi-final rating. T. Okoyama of Japan won his race in 4:53 1-2, breaking the Olympic record and J. Gillula, United States, was second.
The third Canadian, George Larsen, of Hamilton, was eliminated with a time of 5:20 2-5. He took third in his heat to Noel Ryan of Australia and T. Oyokota of Japan.
Rowing Today
The largest crowd of these Olympic Games will gather tomorrow afternoon at Long Beach for the first races of the rowing programme. Officials believe at least 10,000 will swarm along the side of the specially-built salt water basin beside Los Angeles harbor tomorrow and that perhaps 300,000 will be present Wednesday when the eight-oared crews run off their first heats.
Joe Wright, Jr., of Toronto, former Diamond Sculls winner, is the only Canadian slated for competition tomorrow, the other three boats getting their first call the following day. In the first heat of the single sculls, Joe meet Dick Southwood of Great Britain and Guillermo Douglas of Uruguay.
Victory tomorrow for the black-haired son of Joe Wright Sr., famous rowing coach, who has carefully brought the Toronto star to peak form for the Olympics, would place Joe in the singles final. If he loses he must win in the second round against other beaten scullers to make the final.
Bobby Pearce, Giant Australian and defending champion, clashes with Bill Miller of the United States and Herbert Butts of Germany, the present Diamond Sculls champion, in the other heat tomorrow.
Pearce, who has lived at Hamilton, Ont., ever since the British Empire Games in 1930, is overwhelmingly favorite to retain the title.
Feature Event

OLYMPIC NIGHT HORSE RACING AT NORTHAM

LOS ANGELES, Calif., Aug. 8.—Mickey Gallitzen led the United States to another sweeping Olympic victory today, winning the spring-board diving for men over two fellow Americans, Harold Smith and Richard Degener's who took second and third places. Alfie Phillips of Toronto, British Empire champion, was fourth. Gallitzen scored 161.38 points out a possible 200, Smith 138.54, Degener 151.22 and Phillips 134.64. Arthur Stott of Victoria, Canada's second entry in the event, did not place among the leaders and his point total was not announced.
Gallitzen decisively outpointed a field of thirteen divers from seven countries, nearing perfection on nearly every effort, where compulsory or preferential dives. Phillips, well known for his compulsory dives, finished with a series of brilliant dives to get ahead of L. Essar of Germany who took fifth place and Kobayashi of Japan, sixth. Phillips' final three dives were near perfection and ranked with the best efforts of Gallitzen and the second and third place winners. Stott was in good form, except for three ill-judged springs near the end of his schedule.
