

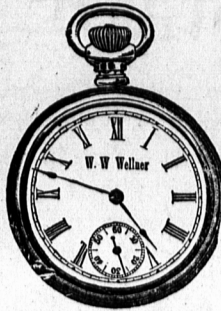

D. Campbell, Toronto, Vice President of the Order of Railway Telegraphers, with headquarters at St. Louis, is expected in the city on Monday night on an official visit to Charlottetown Division No. 47. He will be accompanied by P. W. L. Campbell, St. John, General Chairman of I. C. R. and P. E. I. R. Telegraphers committee.

One of the most unique of natural curiosities seen in the city for some time was discovered yesterday by John C. McKenzie, of the Registry Office. A hen owned by Mr. McKenzie on Thursday last laid at his farm Long Creek an unusually large egg measuring 7 1/2 x 9 inches in circumference. This Mr. McKenzie brought to the city and upon opening it at the home of his sister what was his surprise to find inside the yolk another perfectly formed egg with complete shell, about half the size of the one that enclosed it. The curiosity was seen yesterday by a large number of people many of whom were somewhat incredulous but but could offer no explanation.

The entertainment and supper as announced was held in Pownal Hall on Thursday night. A full house greeted the soloists Miss Katie Gay and V. W. Jones, J. B. Hayley and J. A. Mr. Jones sang "O Canada" very acceptably and J. A. Moore sang "The Holy City" in his own fascinating way. The accompanists were Miss Linda Smith and V. W. Jones. A beautiful supper, plenty of ice cream, and home made candy amply satisfied the wants of the audience to whom thanks of the committee are due for the snug sum realized.

The regular fortnightly meeting of the Cheese Board was held yesterday. There was a fair attendance, the buyers being A. J. Biffin, R. E. Spillett, R. E. Mutch and J. A. Farquharson. The cheese boarded was as follows: Stanley Bridge 170, Cornwall 65, Lakeville 80, Red Point 50, New Glasgow 140, Vernon 85, Hazellbrook 70, East River 48, Red House 51. The cablegram read: Montreal firm, English market firm and advancing, Montreal 11 1/2 to 11 3/4, Kingston sold at 11 1/2, 56 and 57 shillings. The highest bid was 11 1/2 by Mr. Spillett, and he secured union, Cornwall, Lakeville, Stanley Bridge, Red House, Red Point, East River. The president called attention to the scarcity of boxes in many of the factories. Some of the factories failed to make arrangements about boxes last winter and now they can't blame those who are supplying the boxes Messrs Acorn and Spillett. Some of the salesmen said the matter was left with the cheese-makers who supplied all materials. Mr. Spillett said the only resolution was for the directors to take the matter in hand and procure the boxes early. A resolution was unanimously passed that all the factories be recommended to order their boxes by February of each year.

The Winter Fair at Amherst will open on Dec. 4th and last to the 7th. Demonstrations will be given by Prof. M. Cummings of the Agricultural College, Truro, N. S., J. H. Griadale, of Ottawa; Dr. H. G. Reid, Georgetown, Ont.; F. C. Eford, and C. M. Macrae, of Ottawa; H. R. Ross, Sussex, N. B., and J. P. Landry, Truro, N. S., will all give addresses.

There was a large attendance at the market yesterday. The price of butter remained about the same at 22 1/2c per lb and eggs 18 1/2c per doz. Pigeons were plentiful and sold from 7 to 10 c per pair. Blueberries were also in and brought 6c per qt. There was a tendency upwards in the price of hay which sold from 40 to 45c per cwt. Oats sold at 35c per bush. The price of potatoes dropped to 15 and 20c per bush.

At the Halifax Exhibition this year the island sheep raisers as usual carried off the bulk of prizes in their respective classes. S. B. Lane, Southport, will a herd of Oxford Downes carried off four first, three second and four third prizes amounting to \$50. P. H. Lane of Cherry Valley, with a herd of Suffolk sheep took six firsts, two seconds and two third prizes, amounting to \$51. I. S. Lane, city, with a herd of Suffolks took two first, three second and one third prize amounting to \$21. Mr. Boswell of Cherry Valley also got the lion's share of prizes in his class.

For the best exhibition of coal oil and the best exhibition of cod oil (medicinal) J. W. and S. F. Jordan, Black Point, P. E. I. took first prizes at the Halifax Exhibition.

The Island stock that was at the Halifax Exhibition together with some from the Mainland was brought over by the Princess last night. There was also an unusually large number of passengers.

A telegram received last night announced that the Hillsboro tug F. W. Rosling with the W. F. McRae and four dredges in tow had safely reached Quebec yesterday afternoon from this port. She left here on the 12th and met very rough weather.

In the Halifax races Capitola owned by Charles Chandler, city, won in all 105 and Ada Mac owned by W. B. Bowness, Summerside, \$140. The greatest amount, \$770, was taken by J. B. Cowans, Springhill, the next, \$693, was taken by Peter Carroll, Halifax, and the third largest, \$390 by Frank Boutiller, Halifax.

The Nova Scotia Provincial Exhibition was closed Thursday, when 9,300 persons were present, something unusual for the eight days of the year, when the show only covered seven days.

The attendance, considering the weather conditions was good, and had the Commission been favored with fine weather, the figures would no doubt have been away ahead of last year. Out of the eight days, only three of them were fine, and this caused a great set back. Thousands of visitors came to the City during the Fair, and many of the merchants reports business to have been very brisk during the period. The receipts will probably be about \$5,000 less than last year.

The attraction at the Golf links this afternoon should amply satisfy the most enthusiastic lovers of the game. Two championship matches will be played. Miss Anderson and Miss Tooker will finish the 36 hole final match for the ladies' championship and the Canada Life medal. As they tied in the first half of the match the interest is very keen. In the men's championship and Standard Cup competition the second match of 18 holes will be played. The players are drawn as follows:
