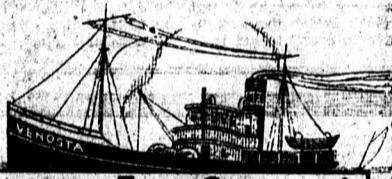

### Cable Ship Retired At End Of 48 Years

LONDON, Nov. 18.—After laying more than 50,000 miles of submarine cable, the Faraday, a ship which perhaps has had a part in more interesting events than any afloat, has been retired and condemned to become a tanker. In its service of forty-eight years it laid eight Atlantic cables, the first in 1874, connecting France with New York, and also the Amazon River and Pacific cables. She is a 6,000-ton vessel, 360 feet long, but is now regarded as obsolete for cable repair and renewal work.

A resident of Summerside charged with violating the prohibition act, was found guilty and sentenced to six months in the county jail; a case against two other men, charged with violating the prohibition by-law, was postponed; two Summerside women, charged with acting in a disorderly manner on the celebration of Halloween, were dismissed with a warning; a man and two women charged with being the proprietors and inmates of a disorderly house were before the court and their case was postponed. One juvenile charged with breaking and stealing was held over for further trial.

### Too Respectable' A Man To Be Named

WINNIPEG, Man., Nov. 17.—Party leaders today discussed the astounding statement of Rev. Dr. C. W. Gordon made at the Presbyterian Synod on Wednesday afternoon, in which he said he had it on good authority that Hon. R. W. Craig, Attorney-General, had been offered a bribe of \$50,000. Leaders should reveal the name of the man who attempted bribery, but Mr. Craig, who is in Ottawa, said the man is too respectable to have his name made public.

"If Attorney-General Craig has been offered a bribe, it is his duty to come right out in the daylight and disclose the name of the man who tried to bribe him," said Major F. A. Taylor, leader of the Conservative party in the Legislature.

"Otherwise there should be a most searching investigation—and the Legislature will have a great deal to say about it. It is a mighty serious thing to admit that the chief officer of the Crown in Manitoba has been approached with a bribe and facts should be most fully disclosed."

John T. Haig, leader in the House, endorsed the stand of Major Taylor. "The Gordon revelation makes it a grave public issue," he said, "and the Attorney-General should reveal the name of the man who tried to bribe him or should be compelled by the Government or Legislature to do so."

TEN DROWNED.—A boat accident on Fifteen Mile Lake, near Shelter Bay, on the north shore of the St. Lawrence, when a speed gasoline boat went through the ice on Monday night, resulted in the loss of ten lives, among whom were a priest, a doctor and a woman, according to late details.

Assortment of details reaching the city, the motorboat left the "six mile portage" on Sunday afternoon with a party of ten, after having stopped at the camp at the foot of the lake, for the priest, Rev. Father Tortellier, to say Mass.

The following day was windy, but no ice had been encountered on the lake previously. The party decided to leave on Monday night for the head of the lake, fifteen miles away.

On the following morning, Tuesday, a tugboat and scow belonging to the Ontario Paper Company struck ice in the middle of the lake, but broke through. On reaching the head of the lake, however, there was no sign that the speed boat had arrived with its ten passengers, so a search party was immediately sent back to the middle of the lake and there it was found that the gasoline launch had struck ice.

The land all around the lake was searched thoroughly, but the only trace of boat or passengers found was floating baggage and clothing. It is certain that the ten passengers perished, and indications are that the boat must have tried in several places to get out of the ice before sinking.

Dr. Romeo Veitch, of Matamoras and Rev.
