Annual Meeting Tignish C. W. L.

The annual meeting of the Tignish Sub-division was held on April 26th with a very good attendance.

The meeting was opened with prayer by the Chaplain, Rev. John A. McDonald, the National Ode "O Canada" was sung by the members.

The president addressed the members and welcomed them to the annual meeting. The roll call was read, and the minutes of the last annual meeting read adopted.

Following is the secretary's Mrs. Evelyn Skerry's report of the year's activities:

As Secretary of the Sub-division I herewith submit a report of the year's activities from April, 1914-April 1915.

At present we have a paid-up membership of 33 members; during the year eleven regular meetings and two executive meetings were held. All questionnaires received were filled in promptly; our obligations are all paid and the treasurer reports \$25.22 taken in and \$203.04 paid out during the past year.

Our convenors on the various committees have done marvellous work along all lines assigned to them. The Altar, Mrs. Octave Gaudet, convenor, reports: Church work has been attended to monthly, collars changed and laundered, vestments repaired, etc. \$24.45 was collected to buy flowers for the repository and the altar at Easter. During the year two altar cloths, two communion cloths, seven purificators, thirteen corporals were made. Flowers were collected during the summer months to decorate the altar and statues; 8 high masses were held during the year, and \$20.00 given to the Church Fund.

Education, Mrs. Claude Kinch, convenor, reports: \$5.00 was given in prizes to the convent and High School at the closing of the school term. During the summer months a dental clinic was held for the school children; 110 pupils received treatment. The classrooms were visited and prizes given to the different grades. A treat was given to the children at Christmas, and the classroom floors in the Dalton School cleaned.

Social Service Convenor, Mrs. Arthur Bernard, reports sending out 5 baskets at Christmas; fruit

Letters of condolence were sent to bereaved families, and 1 high mass for two of our boys who made the supreme sacrifice. \$2.00 was sent to the T. B. League. War Work, Mrs. James Christopher, convenor, reports: 1 high mass offered for peace; 26 spiritual bouquets sent to our chaplain overseas; 10 pairs socks, 4 sweaters, knit, 1 coat, 2 skirts, 2 bath robes, 6 boys' shirts, 1 dozen knickers, 1 dozen dices made. Two members attended the Nursing Course. Six members in the K. of C. magazines: The Canadian League are distributed every month. An account of our meetings sent to the press and magazine for publication. The entertainment committee, Mrs. John Doyle, convenor, have been very zealous in putting on dances, card-parties, bingo parties and pantry sale, to provide the means to carry on our work. I wish to thank the president for the kindness shown me, and all members of the Sub-division for their courtesy and help. Members of the St. Felix unit were present and presented a splendid report of the marvellous work done by their Sub-division. The treasurer reports all bills paid up to date. The chaplain then addressed the meeting, congratulating the St. Felix unit and the convenors of church work, education, social service and war work. on the splendid reports presented, and asked them to carry on their noble services to God and country. The meeting closed with prayer for peace.
