**NAZI POLICE CHIEF HEARD AT FIRE TRIAL**

Firmly Convinced Ernst Torgler "Much Implicated" in Reich Blaze.

 BERLIN, Nov. 6.—(A.P.)—Edmund Heines, the Nazi police chief of Breslau, declared at the Reichstag annual trial today that he was firmly convinced Ernst Torgler, one of the five defendants, was "much implicated" in the blaze.

Torgler, once the Communist whip in the German Parliament, was one who would lead his men from the rear while carefully keeping out of the firing lines himself, witnesses testified.

Heines described as a pack of liars, accusations made against him in the London "Brown Book" compiled by a commission headed by Lord Marley and purporting to list cases of Nazi mistreatment.

He denied he had "nothing whatsoever to do with it," saying he was on Nazi business in Gleiwitz during the Reichstag fire last February 27.

Accuses Torgler  
 "As soon as I learned Torgler had been in the Reichstag on the evening of the fire, I felt sure he had something to do with it," Heines testified.

"As a representative of the Storm Troopers I must say we can hardly understand the forbearance with which the accused are treated here," he added.

Heines participated in Chancellor Hitler's 1923 putsch and was sentenced therefore to 18 months in prison. George Dimitroff, the third Bulgarian, remained in disgrace today.

He was excluded from the session Saturday when he aroused the ire of Reichminister Goering, who testified against Communists.

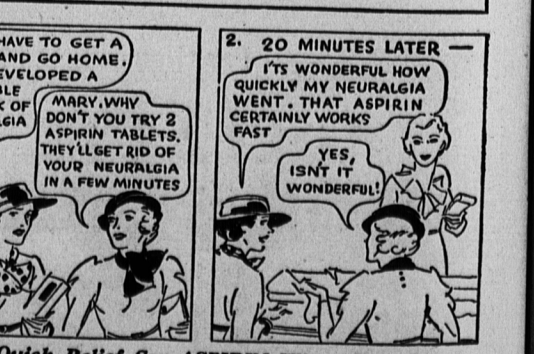
