Fred Astaire And Ginger Rogers In "Follow The Fleet" At Prince Edward

There doesn't seem to be any calling to the rhythmic hopes that the talented Fred Astaire and Ginger Rogers essay into the stratosphere of entertainment. Critics declared "Tot Hat" was tops but Astaire, Miss Rogers and a stellar cast have conspired in production of "Follow the Fleet" to make reviewers dig deep for new superlatives.

That old Rajah of Ragtime, Irving Berlin, has written seven new songs to test the vocal excellencies of Astaire, Miss Rogers, and a new comer to the screen the lovely Harriett Hilliard; and to provide the rhythms for the tantalizing toes of the King and Queen of Terpsichore in the new screen show.

"Follow the Fleet" is a real 'down to earth' musical, employing a logical and meaty story, every day balladisms for the players, and a battleship, a freighter, and the colorful city of San Francisco for realistic backgrounds.

The story is based on the romantic adventures of a pair of Uncle Sam's "bluejackets," Fred Astaire and Randolph Scott ashore. The objects of their affections are Ginger Rogers, who is a night club entertainer, and Harriett Hilliard, a school teacher, whose romantic nature responds to the call of love for the first time. The film is an adaptation of the popular Hugert Osborne comedy, "Shore Leave," which enjoyed a long run on Broadway.

Astaire and Rogers dance together three times, each routine striking a different mood and tempo and each dance introducing new acrobatics to the curriculum of terpsichore. Ginger appears in her first solo dance in this picture, and Fred Astaire does a seven minute tap routine, supplemented by 24 "allors, which is the novelty highlight of the film.

The leading players are supported by a strong and well-balanced cast including Astrid Aelwyn, Ray Mayer, Tony Martin, Edward Burns, Harry Berstford, Lucille Ball, Betty Grable, Joy Hodges, Jeanne Gray and other stars.

"The Big Game" At The Capitol

"The Big Game," thrilling gridiron saga, provides patrons with an hour of intense excitement, laughs and suspense.

Unique in the history of football pictures, the teams appearing in the film consist of real pigskin stars rather than movie extras. Such All-American football heroes as Bobby Wilson, William Shakespeare, "King Kong" Klein, Monk Moscrip, Jay Eberwanger, "Bones" Hamilton, Gomer Jones, "Chuck" Bennis and Frank Alustiza are on one squad, while first-string players from the University of Southern California make up the opposing eleven. Even Philip Huston and Bruce Cabot, who essay the two male leads, were football players in their college days.

Philip Huston, Broadway stage star, makes his debut with pretty June Travis appearing opposite.

Huston and Bruce Cabot are seen as two ex-coal miners who are drafted to exercise their brains and brawn for dear old Atlantic University, a modern college with no great scruples about placing football on a commercial basis. This plot, representing the theme of the picture, vividly discloses how big-time gambling syndicates seek to make a racket from this greatest of all American sports by obtaining inside information.

The plot concerns itself principally with the woe and woe of Huston who, at the height of his fame, is made a scapegoat by his sweetheart's father, a sports writer leading a crusade against the college football system. Huston, with his sweetheart's aid, manages to clear his name, foil the gamblers and win the big game.

Aside from the two romantic leads and Bruce Cabot, the cast includes James Gleason, Andy Devine, C. Henry Gordon, Guinn Williams, Margaret Seddon, Edward Nugent and Barbara Pepper.
