A Liner to the Rescue and Wireless Calls for Help Sent Out

(Canadian Press.) WASHINGTON, Jan. 8—Considerable anxiety is felt today by the officials of the Navy for the safety of the torpedo boat destroyer Terry and its crew of three officers and eighty-three men.

The little vessel, which left New York Thursday in company with seven battle ships of the Atlantic fleet and another torpedo vessel, conveying five destroyers, was discovered yesterday floundering about in heavy seas, helpless between New York and Bermuda.

Captain Laws of the Tagus directed his vessel to the Terry and found the vessel unable to make headway, with her engines disabled and pumps out of order.
