around the whole city, and were shown all the principal attractions and points of interest, by Mr. Robinson, who has been there for many years and was largely interested in real estate and has made considerable money; and he has still great faith in Calgary.

"Our trip through the Rockies was one of the most interesting stages of our trip, as we had no idea of just what they were like until we had seen them. Our impressions were very different by actual sight from what we had learned by reading. When one enters the prairies in Manitoba and goes through that province and enters Saskatchewan--which appeared to us as the two principal wheat-growing places--and then enters Alberta, he finds the lay of the land a bit different, though irregular, and apparently much better adapted for grazing, right up until he meets the Rockies.

"In approaching the coast, the British Columbia lumber districts are quite attractive to the stranger, and besides the lumber one notices here and there some magnificent heavy soil, which must be very productive. We visited New Westminster, and were shown through one of the largest mills in the world. It was exceedingly interesting to see the large logs banded and sawn and put through the mill from its roughest state till they were completely manufactured into doors and other wood products; many of these logs being four and five feet in diameter.

"Vancouver impressed us as an excellent city, and being only about 25 years of age everything in the shape of buildings is quite new and up-to-date. It has not had time to have old and broken-down buildings in its suburbs as the older places have, and has many magnificent structures of the very handsomest kind all through its particular business parts.

"We crossed over by boat to Victoria--about a four-hour run in an excellent steamer--and visited the city, the harbor of which is very small; but the steamers run right into the heart of the city. The Parliament buildings are very handsome and only a few hundred yards from where we landed as is also the magnificent hotel, a part of the C. P. R. system.

"Both in Victoria and Vancouver we met Islanders so numerous and holding such prominent positions that I hardly know whom to mention as I may omit some. I would simply say that all appeared to be doing exceedingly well and very highly thought of.

"The weather on the Coast whilst we were there was extremely mild, raining part of the time. Crocuses were well out in bloom and in some instances we noted gardeners using their spades and making ready for spring.

"The large number of business men that we met in Vancouver, both in a business way and socially, were all of a solid, high-class type--men who had not made their fortunes in a day but had all worked up from the start of the city and had taken advantage of the opportunities afforded them by a quick-growing city, and they were very proud of their city.

"Speaking of the Dominion Trust Company, at whose instance the trip was made, we were exceedingly highly impressed with the character and the amount of business being done with all parts of the world, their connections in London and Antwerp affording a very large and remunerative business. IN MEMORIAM

JAMES EDWARD SENTNER. The subject of this sketch was born at Alexandria, P. E. I., on April 2nd 1811, and died at Pownal on Feb. 18th, 1914, having, therefore, almost reached 93 years. Early in life Mr. Sentner moved with his parents to Charlottetown. After a few years the family moved to St. Peters Road, and in 1835 they settled in Village Green about two miles from Pownal Village. The years between 1835 and

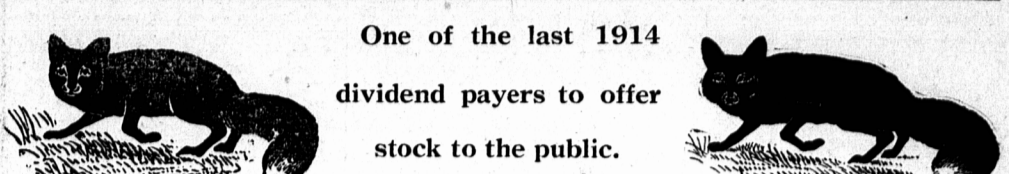

1888 were spent in hard work and prosperity on the beautiful farm now owned by Mr. A. D. Brehaut, Village Green. For the past 25 years Mr. Sentner lived in Pownal Village where his days were closed. He was married three times. His first wife was Sarah Brehaut. To this union were entrusted five children two of whom are living, namely, Lemuel, formerly of the firm of "Sentner & McLeod," Charlottetown, but now of Bruderkeim Alta., and Mrs. John Acorn of Millview. Mr. Sentner's second wife was Hannah McGregor whom he married in 1895; his third wife, who survives him was, Amelia Enman. Early in life Mr. Sentner experienced conversion and united with the Pownal Methodist Church. Being blessed with the gift of song he was leader of the singing from 1852 to 1885. He filled the office of the cha- pel Steward efficiently for over 40 years; acted as trustee of Parsonage Church for 33 years. He was associated with no less than twenty-four ministers during his connection with the Pownal Methodist Church. His death was calm and easy. He had the full assurance of faith. His funeral was largely attended. Rev. E. S. Weeks and Rev. Mr. McVie officiating. The pall bearers were M. Acorn, Jas. Nov, Wm. Judson, Fred and Jas. Praught and Wilfred Lawton. Interment was in Pownal Cemetery.

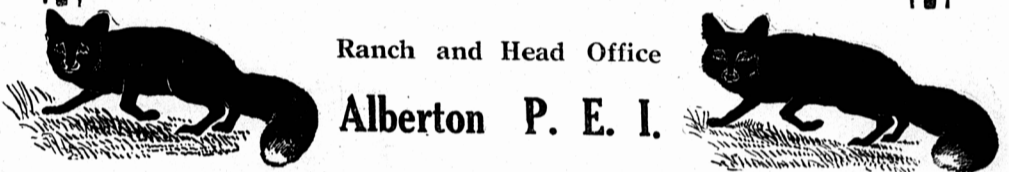
