Court Dismisses "Fast" Motorist

C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) HAMILTON, Bermuda, Oct. 11. (C.P.)—Witnesses possessing motor-vehicle experience gained in Canada and Australia were heard in court here when George Boorman, driver of one of Bermuda's few motor-vehicles—a public works department lorry—was halted before the magistrate for excessive speeding.

The complainant estimated Boorman was driving at a rate of 30 miles an hour at the time of the alleged offence and the prosecution held it was a clear case of "excessive speeding."

Lionel Trisler, a passenger in the lorry said from his driving experience in Australia he didn't believe the machine was travelling more than 15 miles an hour.

British Go After More India Trade

(By The Canadian Press) LONDON, Oct. 14.—British business men's first organized tour of India, Burma and Ceylon will leave England Nov. 9.

Expected to number 50 or more the party will spend more than two months travelling through the country in a train placed at their disposal by the Indian railway authorities.

Every opportunity is being afforded to study the possibilities both of extending the market for British goods and of increasing the purchases by Britain of the products of India and Ceylon industries. Organized by the Association of Indian Municipalities, of which the Agha Khan is patron and the Gaekwar of Baroda president-elect, the party will visit 27 towns in India, Burma and Ceylon. Civic receptions are being arranged in many of the centres, while the Gaekwar of Baroda, who is celebrating his jubilee this year, is making special preparations for the entertainment of the travellers.

Hoodlums Busy At Halifax Port

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) HALIFAX, Oct. 14.—Encountering no opposition in a raid on historic King's Wharf, customs and military forces today, a gang of hoodlums attempted to free the military water transport steamship Alfreda and the customs patrol boat A from their moorings.

Glass in the wheel house and cabin of the Alfreda and a skylight on the customs A, were shattered. The boat tied up at the same dock, but nothing was taken.

The windshield of a car on a wharf nearby was also smashed and its wiring system destroyed. Fingerprint found on glass from the windshield gave city and Royal Canadian mounted Police their only clue for an investigation.
