CONCERNING SOCIAL CUSTOMS.

This little talk is meant to bring a few faces to your mind that might otherwise be forgotten in the rush of shopping and Christmas festivities. The truth that it is wished to impress upon you is not new, but will bear repetition; it is the fact that "the gift without the giver is bare." You must put a little of your heart into your presents, and must make the recipient feel that he or she is worth the thought that a gift is supposed to stand for. One clever little woman, who spends the smallest amount of money on her gifts of anyone in her circle, makes the most of her brightness and cleverness, and in the very wrapping of the gifts there is an individuality that is more pleasing than costliness. She stands behind the gift.

Let the fact be emphasized that the idea of the great gift day is in danger of becoming lost under the heap of dollars that you must pay. Why not try a little more heart in your gifts this time?

First think of the person to whom you are going to give. Recall the taste, that likes and the general character of the man or woman. Let these be your guide. If the recipient is a reader, nothing can be more appropriate and considerate than a book. Let your taste and reinforcement be shown in the choice of author, the binding and in the little inscription. A little verse about books, reading or the author himself will show that you have taken the trouble to make the gift distinctive. It is always appreciated.

The older woman deserves a special thought, for she has outgrown the frivolity of youth; the business woman will sometimes appreciate a reminder that life is not all business; the butterfly is very easy to suit, for there are innumerable trinkets and accessories that she will appreciate. A little card or verse that refers to the article given, written on a plain card and painted in crayon or water-colors in a simple way, will be treasured, perhaps, long after the gift is worn out. A wreath of holly or mistletoe behind the initials will add the personal touch that is so valuable.

The extra thought can be expended on the wrapping, the card and the appropriateness of the gift. It will counterbalance the high price that you may not be able to afford, and that, anyway, cannot cover up the deficiencies in the little things.

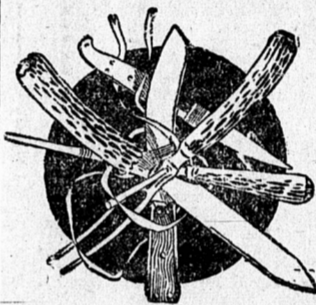

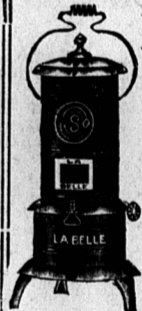

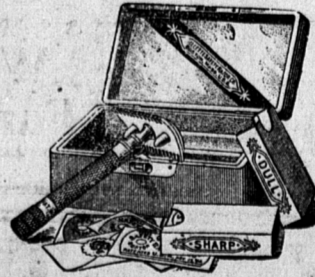
