SOME DOUBT ABOUT THE MAINE ELECTION

PORTLAND, Maine, Sept. 12.—The official returns late last night indicated that Prohibition has been voted out of the constitution of the State of Maine by a bare majority of 1,400 votes! About twenty-five small towns had not reported and the vote of these together with errors incident to the collection of returns by telephone still left exact result in some doubt. One hundred and twenty thousand voters visited the polls and cast their ballots on the question. With the 21 towns missing the vote was 60,878 for repeal and 59,563 against a change in the constitution. As has been predicted the cities were the chief strongholds of the repeal faction, but the majority of 12,000 in the total city vote was barely sufficient according to the latest available returns to offset the vote of the rural communities. Although the vote cast today did not equal that of a year ago when the democrats swept the state, which had for years been a republican stronghold, the election was without question one that the state has never known. There was not a home in any section of the state not to look up the polls and cast their ballots on the question. In today's election Aroostook county, in the northwestern section of the state, was the chief source of comfort to the temperance people casting a large majority against repeal, while Calais, on the New Brunswick border, was the only one of the twenty cities of the state to go for prohibition. “Our store is recognized by all people to be the best place for prescriptions. CANADIAN LOCOMOTIVE COMPANY

McCaig Bros. & Co., Montreal, in their weekly Circular, referring to Canadian Locomotive Co., says: Canada is a country of vast distances and its rapid development will force the railroads to pursue a policy of constant expansion for many years to come. For the operation of this new mileage, new equipment will be required and manufacturers of locomotives and cars will have a constantly increasing volume of business. AN OLD ESTABLISHED BUSINESS. It was this expectation that led to the formation of the Canadian Locomotive Company, and the purchase by it in June of the present year of the Kingston Locomotive Works. This company, which has been in existence since 1855, was the oldest locomotive manufacturing concern in the Dominion, but the business had grown at such a rapid rate in recent years that it had been compelled to refuse large orders from time to time, and it had become evident that the time for expansion had come, a fact which was fully realized by the people behind the new company, who had in view the immediate increase of the capacity of the plant in order to handle the available business. The company's plant is situated at Kingston, Ont., where it occupies three city blocks, having a large frontage on Lake Ontario. The real estate owned by the company is very much in excess of the company's present requirements, and will provide for future extensions of the plant for many years to come. The location of the plant at this point is a very advantageous and a central one, with its own deep water docks on Lake Ontario, and having the tracks of the Grand Trunk and into its premises. In addition, the Canadian Northern will shortly enter Kingston. Consequently the facilities for the transportation of supplies and products inwards and outwards could hardly be improved on. Under an agreement with the city of Kingston, the company is exempt from all taxation except School Tax, up to the year 1916. With regard to the operation of the plant, power is at present obtained from the company's own steam plant, of which, owing to the location of the plant, coal is obtained at low rates. It is expected, however, that before long hydro-electric power will be transmitted to Kingston, in which event it should be able to effect considerable economy in the cost of operation. LARGE DEMAND FOR COMPANY'S LOCOMOTIVES. The plant, which has at present an annual output of about 75 engines, is in every respect equipped for the building of the most modern and up-to-date locomotives. As however, for some years past valuable orders have had to be refused owing to the inability of the plant to take care of all the business offering, the capacity of the plant will be immediately doubled. The locomotives turned out by the company are used by all the large Canadian Railways, and are said to be at least equal to any others produced on this continent. This is largely due to the excellence of the company's employees, who are on a profit sharing basis as regards their work, and receive consequently very high wages. There is consequently very little possibility of labor troubles. The Canadian Locomotive Company has a total outstanding capital of \$1,500,000 of bonds, \$2,500,000 of 7 per cent. The financial position of the company is exceedingly strong as the \$1,179,548 of net assets given above includes \$755,000 of municipal and other high grade bonds, which can all be readily realized upon. The profits of the old company for the four years 1907, 1908, 1909 and 1910, after allowing for depreciation, amounted to \$290,719, which, after providing for bond interest, was equal to a little less than double the preferred stock dividend and left a surplus equal to almost 5 per cent on the Common Stock. It is stated that as a result of the increased capacity of the plant, the earnings in the course of the next few years should be \$600,000 per annum, or in the neighborhood of 18 per cent. on the Common Stock, but even if results fall considerably below this estimate, the shareholders will have no cause for complaint.
