Exhibition Notes The opening of the Provincial Exhibition will take place at eight p.m. sharp this evening in the Paton Pavilion. Short addresses will be given by His Honor Lieutenant Governor DeBlois, Premier Thane Campbell, Honorable Charles A. Dunning, Mayor P. W. Turner, Honorable W. H. Dennis and others.

The race horses that will start are all in with the exception of the Enor four, which will arrive from Winnipeg tonight. Earle Avery has the largest number in one string—ten. They are very beautiful animals and seem to be in the pink and ready to race for their lives.

Tuesday's races will consist of the Four-Year-Old Futurity which will have Guy Ann 2.16½, Dorothy Dix trial 2.15, Hi-Six 2.25½, Millie Kalmuck 2.14½ and Jackie Volo. The 2.11 class will have Bud Wenger 2.65½, Marvin Brooke 2.04½, Abner T. Clegg 2.04½, Royal Hanover 2.06½, Marjorie M. 2.07½ and other stars. This race is really a Free-for-All. Then there will be the 2.17 Trot with Calumet Coburn 2.10½, fresh from the Maine tracks, Silk Girl 2.09½, Harvest Melody 2.10½, Calumet Harvest Melody 2.12½, Aliset 2.15½ and others. This is one of the best race programs of the four days and will get underway at two o'clock sharp.

It is expected that the Honorable Charles A. Dunning will make a few remarks at the opening afternoon program in front of the Grand Stand on Tuesday. He is expected to remain in the Province for a few days. This afternoon Mr. David Stewart and Mr. Fortier of the Macdonald Tobacco Company will arrive by plane for the Exhibition.
