But the next day seven of the trunks were unpacked and their contents distributed amongst the Tommies. The clever lady had snapped her fingers at red tape and smuggled comforts through to the men in the war. One small trunk contained her kit.

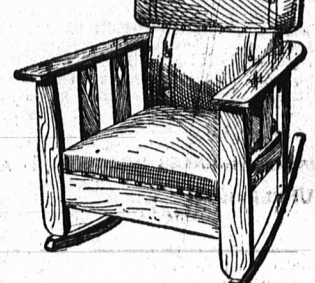
