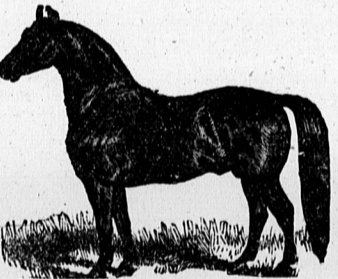

## TEACHERS' SALARIES NOW AND THIRTY YEARS AGO

Mr. Editor:—In a former communication, I referred to the necessity of more financial support for our schools, and to the need of making provision to have our teachers prepared to give instruction in subjects allied to agriculture. In the present letter, I purpose drawing comparisons between the salaries received by teachers at the present day and thirty years ago, also between the support given to education in this Province and in the neighboring Provinces of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia.

By an examination of the reports of education for the different years, it will be found that the decrease began when the Government repealed the supplementary clause of the Education Act. Not only did the teacher lose the amount of supplement that the Government had previously paid, but the districts not having the stimulus which the Government's offer to duplicate the district supplements supplied, also voted less. In the year 1898, the last year the Government paid supplements, the school districts, not including Charlottetown and Summerside, paid their teachers \$4,342 in supplements. The following year, 1899, when no Government supplement was paid, the district supplement fell to \$3919.

The hardship to the teacher indicated by the above is intensified, when we remember that living expenses have increased very much during the past 30 years. In New Brunswick the teachers of corresponding classes to those in this Province are paid the following average salary, and the increase during the past ten (10) years has been as follows:

Besides these classes, there are two higher grades, the Grammar and Superior Classes, the average salaries of which are \$1,065, and \$692 respectively.

A large part of the increase has been contributed by the Provincial Government, the grant to teachers being \$57,684 more in the year 1910 than it was in 1900.

I am unable from the information at hand, to give the average salaries paid to the teachers of Nova Scotia, but from the last education report, I find that, that Province paid in the last fiscal year \$19.28 for every pupil in daily attendance, while this Province had each pupil in daily attendance educated for \$14.50.

There is not any objection to have work done cheaply if it is done efficiently, but it is much to be feared that the cheaper work done in our schools means inefficiency, and if something is not done, at once, the work will become still more inefficient.

Other phases of the education question must wait for another communication.

## PIERPONT MORGAN GOLD-BRICKED

PARIS, April 15—Pierpont Morgan has written to M. J. M. Du Jardin Becomis, minister of fine arts, offering to restore to France a religious relic known as St. Martin's Head, which dates from the middle ages. If the minister is right, Mr. Morgan has been "stung," for Du Jardin Beaumetz asserts that the relic Mr. Morgan bought is not the original, which was stolen from the Church at Souleille-Sur-Uzel in 1907, but is a copy made in 1900, while the original was being shown at the Paris exhibition of that year.

Mr. Morgan will proceed legally against the dealer who sold him the copy, it is expected.
